USDA Approves Disaster Food Assistance for Alabama Disaster-Designated Counties

The Alabama Department of Human Resources has received approval from the U.S. government to provide food to people who otherwise might not qualify for the Food Assistance Program. The first counties to begin this program, called a Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (D-SNAP), are Cullman, DeKalb, Franklin, Jefferson, Lawrence, Marshall, Tuscaloosa and Walker counties. The remaining counties that received a federal disaster declaration will operate a D-SNAP program in coming weeks.

USDA Approves Disaster Food Assistance for Jefferson County

BIRMINGHAM, AL – The Alabama Department of Human Resources (DHR) has received approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) to operate a Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (D-SNAP) in Jefferson County. This program is designed to provide food benefits to people who might not ordinarily qualify for the Food Assistance Program. The remaining 33 counties that received a federal disaster declaration will operate a D-SNAP program in the upcoming weeks. NEW- \$10 Million Grant to Fund Temporary Jobs for Tornado Victims

MONTGOMERY—Alabama residents who lost their jobs because of the devastating April 27 tornadoes will be eligible for new employment helping their communities recover. Gov. Robert Bentley announced a \$10 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor that will be used to hire temporary workers to help local governments in the hardest hit areas. The workers will clear debris and start the rebuilding process and also may staff shelters and food banks. “The April 27 tornadoes left a path of devastation that not only included lives and properties, but also jobs,” Bentley said. “This grant will give both communities and unemployed workers a much-needed helping hand.” County and municipal governments will work with Alabama Career Centers in their areas to find applicants who are eligible for the temporary jobs. First priority for employment will be given to workers whose employers are closed because of the tornadoes. The workers will assist with the demolition, repair, renovation and reconstruction of destroyed public facilities within the affected communities. Counties targeted for assistance in hiring temporary workers include Bibb, Calhoun, Cullman, DeKalb, Elmore, Fayette, Franklin, Hale, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marion, Marshall, St. Clair, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa and Walker. Additional counties may be included at a later date.

The Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs applied for the National Emergency Grant on April 29. Municipal and county governments should contact ADECA at (334) 242-5886 to request funding for the temporary worker program.

Alabama Emergency Management Agency (AEMA)

Program: **NEW-Alabama Public Assistance Portal**

Description: This site is for the online application and management of the Public Assistance grant in Alabama. Public Assistance (PA) is a federal grant program to aid State and local governments in returning a disaster area to pre-disaster conditions. A minimum of 75% of eligible costs is provided to primarily address the repair and restoration of public facilities, infrastructure, or services which have been damaged or destroyed. Eligible applicants include local and Tribal governments as well as certain Private Non-Profit organizations

IRS Explains Tax Relief Offered for Federally-Declared Counties

AL/TN-2011-28AL,

The IRS offered answers to these common questions about disaster tax relief:

1. Who is considered eligible for tax relief?

Generally, taxpayers who reside in or whose principal place of business is in a declared county are considered by the IRS to be "affected" by the disaster. The IRS automatically identifies taxpayers located in the covered disaster area and applies automatic filing and payment relief.

But affected taxpayers who reside or have a business located outside the covered disaster area must call the IRS disaster hotline at 1-866-562-5227 to request this tax relief.

Taxpayers not in the covered disaster area, but whose records necessary to meet a deadline are in the covered disaster area, are also entitled to relief. In addition, all relief workers affiliated with a recognized government or philanthropic organization assisting in the relief activities in the covered disaster area and any individual visiting the covered disaster area who was killed or injured as a result of the disaster are entitled to relief.

2. What relief is offered?

Some of the relief available to affected taxpayers in the federally-declared counties includes:

-delaying filing or paying most types of federal taxes that were due April 15 through June 30 until June 30, 2011 without penalty. This includes individual federal tax returns that were due April 18.

-amending their 2010 tax return now to claim a casualty loss for storm damage instead of having to wait until next year to claim it when they file their 2011 tax return. Note that the casualty loss provision is often of greatest benefit to individuals and businesses who had little or no insurance on property that was damaged or destroyed.

-getting expedited copies of prior year tax returns and having the normal fees waived.

-writing the disaster designation "Alabama/Severe Storms, Tornadoes, Straight-line Winds, and Flooding" at the top of any tax return or correspondence sent to the IRS and getting expedited processing.

3. Are there any tax credits or deductions that may benefit storm victims?

Taxpayers who are repairing and rebuilding after the storms may qualify for a tax credit on their 2011 tax return for the purchase of qualifying heating and air units, insulation, exterior doors and windows and other energy-efficient items. The list of items that qualify is at www.energystar.gov.

4. Are storm victims who don't live in the declared disaster area eligible for any tax relief?

Taxpayers who were affected by the storms but are not within the declared disaster area may be able to claim a casualty loss on their 2011 tax returns when they file next year.

- Program:** **NEW-Biomass Crop Assistance Program (BCAP)**
- Deadline:** **May 27, 2011.** Alabama Farm Service Agency State Office at 4121 Carmichael Road, Suite 600, Montgomery, AL 36106.
- Description:** BCAP provides incentives to eligible farmers, ranchers and forest landowners for the establishment and production of biomass crops for heat, power, bio-based products and biofuels. BCAP project areas are specific geographic areas where producers grow eligible biomass crops. Producers then receive annual payments for growing those crops.

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- Program:** **Farm Services Agency Disaster Programs**
- Description:** Farmers may visit their local Farm Services Agency office to learn more about disaster programs. Programs for assistance regarding damage at animal operations resulting in animal mortality.FSA administers several important programs that help producers recover from disaster damage and livestock deaths. Among the key programs available to address impacts from disasters are:

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)—provides funding for farmers to rehabilitate farmland damaged by a natural disaster (check with local FSA Office for sign-up periods, which are set by county FSA committees)

Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP)—provides assistance to livestock producers for livestock deaths from a natural disaster event (must file a notice of loss within 30 calendar days of the loss event or of when the loss of livestock was apparent to the participant)

Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP)— provides emergency relief to producers of livestock, honey bees, and farm-raised fish, and covers losses not adequately covered by any other disaster program (must

file notice of loss within the earlier of 30 calendar days of when the loss is apparent to the participant, or 30 calendar days after the end of the calendar year in which the loss occurred)

Tree Assistance Program (TAP)—provides assistance to orchardists and nursery tree growers for losses due to a natural disaster (must file notice of loss within 90 calendar days from the date of the disaster event or the date when the loss of trees, bushes or vines is apparent)

Emergency Forest Restoration Program (EFRP)—provides assistance to eligible owners of nonindustrial private forest land in order to carry out emergency measures to restore land damaged by a natural disaster (check with local FSA Office for sign-up periods, which are set by county FSA committees)

Noninsured Disaster Assistance Program (NAP)—provides assistance to eligible producers affected by a natural disaster, covering noninsurable crop losses and prevented planting (must file notice of loss within 15 calendar days of date of loss or of the date damage to the crop or loss of production becomes apparent to the participant)

Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) Program—provides assistance for crop production and/or quality losses due to a natural disaster

during recovery, and wish all those affected the best during these times. The amended RFP is attached along with the School Energy Improvement Application.

Program: **State Energy Program (ARRA) – Energy Efficient Retrofits of K-12 Public Schools Request for Proposals (3rd Round)**

Deadline: **EXTENDED to 5/27/2011 5:00 PM CST**

Description: The Energy Division is soliciting proposals from public school systems in Alabama for the purchase and installation of energy-efficient improvements in K-12 schools located within their jurisdiction. Energy efficiency improvements eligible for funding include the following:

- Insulation
- HVAC replacement
- Lighting upgrades
- Lighting controls
- Energy Management systems

Applicants must provide documentation that a minimum of sixty percent (60%) of students in the system are eligible to receive free or reduced price lunch. The optimal payback period on retrofits should be 10 years or less.

Program: **DOE and HUD Launch Pilot Home Efficiency Financing**

Description: DOE and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) unveiled on April 21 a list of 18 lenders that will participate in a new two-year pilot program offering homeowners low-cost loans to make energy-saving improvements to their homes. These new "PowerSaver" loans, backed by the Federal Housing Administration, will offer homeowners up to \$25,000 to make energy efficient improvements of their choice. Applicants can use the loans for the installation of insulation, duct sealing,

replacement doors and windows, HVAC systems, water heaters, solar panels, and geothermal systems.

Description: An applicant must be a private, non-profit Community Development Corporation (CDC) having a 501 (c)(3) status with the IRS, experienced in planning, developing, or managing low-income housing or community development activities. For purposes of this grant program, the CDC must be governed by a Board of Directors consisting of residents of the community and business and civic leaders.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. -- The thousands of Alabama residents affected by the tornadoes have a lot on their minds. But one vital thing needs to be on survivors' recovery lists: Register for disaster assistance with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Those affected should not put off applying for help because they have insurance. Many may have losses not covered by auto or homeowners' policies.

The same goes for renters. There are FEMA grants to assist with temporary housing, personal property losses and serious disaster-related needs.

There are three easy ways to register..

- By **phone**, call **800-621-FEMA (3362)** from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., local time. Operators are multilingual. For the speech or hearing impaired, the number is **TTY 800-462-7585**.
- By **computer**, go online to www.DisasterAssistance.gov.
- By **smartphone** or **tablet**, go to m.fema.gov.

Remember, it is critical FEMA has a good contact number.

Once registered, survivors may receive a disaster loan application from the U.S. Small Business Administration. Homeowners and renters must complete and return it to be referred to other FEMA programs. Applicants are not required to accept a loan. Survivors may apply directly to the SBA before insurance claims are settled. Low-interest disaster loans are available to cover residential and business losses. For more information on the SBA program visit a disaster recovery center or call the SBA customer service number at **800-659-2955**.

Forty-two Alabama counties are now eligible for disaster assistance. They are: **Autauga, Bibb, Blount, Calhoun, Chambers, Cherokee, Chilton, Choctaw, Clarke, Colbert, Coosa, Cullman, DeKalb, Elmore, Etowah, Fayette, Franklin, Greene, Hale, Jackson, Jefferson,**

Lamar, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marengo, Marion, Marshall, Monroe, Morgan, Perry, Pickens, Shelby, St. Clair, Sumter, Talladega, Tallapoosa, Tuscaloosa, Walker, Washington and Winston counties.

Once registered, stay in touch. FEMA's helpline (800-621-3362) is a key source of information – from tracking the progress of applications to finding the closest disaster recovery center for one-on-one help.

FEMA's mission is to support our citizens and first responders to ensure that as a nation we work together to build, sustain, and improve our capability to prepare for, protect against, respond to, recover from, and mitigate all hazards.

Governor Bentley Announces State Financial Assistance to Help in the Debris Removal Process

MONTGOMERY— As the clean up from the April 27 tornados begin, Governor Robert Bentley today announced the State of Alabama will assume all non-federal cost share requirements for Public Assistance Category A (Debris Removal) regardless of whether the local jurisdiction requests direct Federal Assistance from the US Army Corps of Engineers or uses a private debris contractor. “I want our local communities to immediately get to work cleaning this storm debris and I understand the struggle on how local governments will pay their share,” said Governor Robert Bentley. “So that there is no delay in getting this recovery and rebuilding process moving quickly, I have committed the state to pay the local government’s share for 30 days.”

If a local jurisdiction uses a private contractor for debris removal, the State of Alabama will assume the non-federal cost share from the date the local jurisdiction notifies the contractor to proceed. If the local jurisdiction requests the US Army Corps of Engineers perform the debris removal, the State of Alabama will assume the non-federal cost share for debris removal for 30 days. The State of Alabama will not assume any costs associated with debris removals that are not qualified for payment or reimbursement under applicable Federal Public Assistance Debris Removal regulations, rules or guidance. Local jurisdictions can immediately begin coordination with the local EMA Director to start the process of removing debris.

90 percent federal funding authorized for debris removal

The President has authorized federal funding for Public Assistance for 90 percent of total eligible costs until June 12 for direct federal assistance for debris removal in areas of extensive and catastrophic damage. The intent of the 90 percent federal share is to ensure speedy debris removal.

(ATLANTA – May 11, 2011) – Due to recent tornadoes, severe and straight-line winds, storms, and flooding in the Southeastern United States, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region 4 is cautioning homeowners, volunteers, and other workers to take steps to ensure that individuals, especially children, are not at increased risk for lead poisoning, because of clean up and/or repair work. EPA urges pregnant women and children to keep away from work that could disturb lead-based paint and that those working on potential lead-based paint surfaces take precautions to prevent the spread of lead dust.

Lead dust may pose a hazard to children and pregnant women during cleanup resulting from natural disasters. Lead contaminated dust is the most significant source of lead exposure for children. Common renovation activities like sanding, cutting and demolition can create hazardous lead dust and chips by disturbing lead-based paint, which can be harmful to adults and children. Lead-based paint was used in more than 38 million homes until it was banned for residential use in 1978. Lead exposure can cause reduced IQ, learning disabilities, developmental delays, and behavioral problems in young children....

The RRP program mandates that contractors, property managers and others working for compensation, in homes and child-occupied facilities built before 1978, must be trained and use lead-safe work practices. They are also required to provide a copy of the lead pamphlet “Renovate Right; Important Lead Hazard Information for Families, Child Care Providers and Schools” to owners and occupants before starting renovation work.
