STATEMENT FROM CONGRESSWOMAN TERRI A. SEWELL IN HONOR OF DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

January 20, 2014

Washington, DC – Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-07) released the following statement today in recognition of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day which will be observed on Monday, January 20.

“Today, as we honor the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., let us rededicate ourselves to living out the mission which he envisioned. May we never forget the important lessons he taught us. Dr. King showed us that hatred and injustice stands no chance when confronted with nonviolent action and compassion. As we reflect upon the past and the work that lies ahead, we know that the lessons of Dr. King are as relevant today as they were in 1964.

We should take this time to celebrate the progress we have made toward realizing the dream of Dr. King. As we celebrate this progress, we must honor Dr. King by making his unfinished work our own. We cannot forget the work that lies ahead and our responsibility to promote economic and social justice in our communities. We learned from Dr. King that the gift of freedom requires the ever vigilant dedication of all who are committed to justice and unity. It is my hope that we will honor Dr. King’s legacy by recommitting ourselves to living a life of service each and every day.”

CONGRESSWOMAN TERRI A. SEWELL STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF OMNIBUS FUNDING BILL

January 15, 2014

Washington, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell released the following statement regarding the omnibus funding legislation:

“Today, I voted in favor of the bipartisan funding bill for 2014. Congress has finally taken a step in the right direction by funding the federal government in a responsible manner and ending the drastic cuts imposed by sequestration. This legislation keeps the government open, eliminates the uncertainty caused by partisan brinkmanship and ensures that important services are provided to the American people.

In particular, I am pleased that this bill issues a reprieve for those facing flood insurance premium increases, addresses sexual assault in the Department of Defense, repeals last year’s cuts to veteran’s benefits, restores full funding for Head Start and boosts funding for Early Head Start. However, the bill falls short of fully funding programs critically important to the people of Alabama, like the Community Development Block Grant Program. Likewise, the legislation does not extend the emergency unemployment insurance program that is relied upon by 13,482 Alabamians.

While the omnibus agreement does not adequately fund many critically important programs, it is a welcomed departure from the harmful sequestration cuts that have undermined our National Security, harmed American families and weakened our fragile economic recovery.

Alabama supports a variety of need-based, and merit-based, scholarships and grants for its resident students.

General Scholarships and Grants from the state of Alabama:

Alabama provides a wide range of scholarships and grants for its resident college-bound students. These awards may be based on merit or need, or a combination of the two. As always, programs are subject to change depending on the availability of funding.

The following examples should demonstrate the scope of Alabama's financial aid programs as administered by either the Alabama Commission on Higher Education or the Southeast Alabama Community Foundation.

- The [Alabama Student Assistance Program](#) provides need-based grants for undergraduate students enrolled in an accredited state college or university. Students must be Alabama residents. Award amounts range from \$300 to \$2500.
- The [Alabama Student Grant Program](#) offers grant awards to eligible students enrolled at least part-time in a participating independent Alabama college or university. This is a merit-based grant program, and is only open to undergraduate students. Eligible students may receive up to \$1200 per academic year subject to the availability of state funds.
- The [Alabama Junior and Community College Athletic Scholarship Program](#) provides scholarship funds to full-time students enrolled at an Alabama public junior or community college. Awards are based on demonstrated athletic ability as determined by trials. The scholarship offers awards up to the full cost of tuition, less any other financial aid already received.
- The [Alabama Junior and Community College Performing Arts Scholarship](#) is a merit-based award available to full-time students enrolled in a performing arts program at an

Alabama public junior or community college. Awards are determined by audition, and may not exceed the full cost of tuition less any other financial aid already received.

- The [Ronnie Mendheim Memorial Scholarship](#) is available to graduating seniors of any Dothan County High School. Awards are based on a combination of academic merit and a history of community service.
- The [Earl P. Andrews Jr. Memorial Scholarship](#) is available to graduating seniors attending high school in Montgomery County. The annual award is given to a minority student who meets the required levels of academic achievement and financial needs. The annual award amounts is \$2000.
- The [Dr. James H. French Memorial Scholarship](#) is available to graduating seniors from any Pike County high school. The award is based on a combination of merit, need, and a history of community service. Applicants must submit two letters of reference, and an essay outlining their educational and career goals in order to be considered for the award. Scholarship awards range from \$1000 to \$2000.

Career Specific Scholarships and Grants

The state of Alabama supports a variety of scholarships and grants dedicated to encouraging and supporting those resident students with specific career goals. Many of these programs are designed to encourage students to pursue careers in high need fields that are critical to the infrastructure of the state.

The following are a few examples of career specific financial aid programs for resident students attending one of Alabama's state colleges or universities.

- The [Martha Holley Memorial Nursing Scholarshi](#) is available to graduating seniors of any Elmore County High School who is pursuing a degree in nursing. The award is determined on the basis of academic accomplishment, community service and financial need. Annual award amounts vary.
- The [Marie Aron Panhorst Scholarship Fund](#) provides financial assistance to students enrolled in a Business Marketing course at an accredited Alabama college or university. Award amounts vary, and are determined by academic merit and financial need.

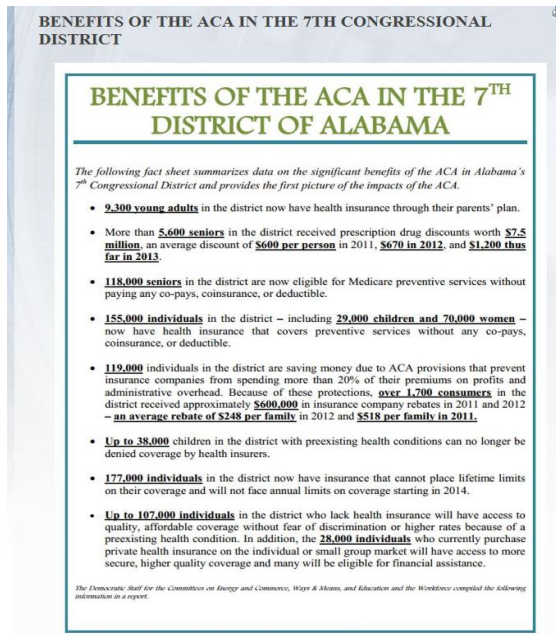
