Sewell, Smith Introduce Bills to Improve Rural Access to Healthcare

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Congresswoman Terri Sewell (D-AL) and Congressman Adrian Smith (R-NE), senior members of the House Ways and Means Committee and representatives of rural congressional districts, introduced two bills to improve rural access to healthcare this week.

H.R. 1041, the Critical Access Hospital Relief Act, will repeal Medicare’s 96-hour rule, which requires a medical facility to either discharge or transfer a patient within four days of admittance. This arbitrary deadline amounts to an undue burden on both hospitals and patients in rural areas where hospitals are typically more distant from one another, forcing a choice between early discharge and a long, expensive transfer. While the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has temporarily addressed this issue through rulemaking, H.R. 1041 would ensure it is addressed permanently.

H.R. 1052, the Physician Assistant Direct Payment Act, will allow physician assistants to be directly compensated by Medicare in order to expand their role as medical providers in underserved communities. At present, physician assistants are the only providers allowed to bill Medicare for services rendered, but required to have their payments routed through a third party such as a physician or hospital.

From Representative Sewell:

“We know that access to good primary care results in people living longer, healthier lives, but in many communities across the country, including many in Alabama’s 7th District, medical professional shortages threaten access to quality health care. Our Medicare payment policies must eliminate barriers that stand in the way of our ability to attract qualified medical talent to rural and underserved areas, such as physician assistants,” Sewell said. “Every American should be able to receive the care they need, regardless of where they live, but the 96-hour rule disproportionately threatens access to health care for Americans living in rural areas, like my constituents serviced by Choctaw General Critical Access Hospital, and severely affects Critical Access Hospitals’ ability to operate. I look forward to working with Rep. Smith to advance these common sense proposals.”

From Representative Smith:

“I thank Rep. Sewell for joining me to introduce these bills whose goal is to improve access to healthcare in rural areas like Nebraska’s Third District and Alabama’s Seventh District. Rural Americans are frequently left out of the debate in Washington and it’s imperative we continue to fight for their best interests. The repeal of Medicare’s 96-hour rule and allowing physician assistants to be paid directly by Medicare are two great examples of ensuring rural Americans receive better care.”

Reps. Sewell, Kind Introduce Bipartisan, Bicameral Trade Security Act Aimed at Reforming National Security Tariffs

Bill reforms Section 232 tariff procedures to increase Congressional and DoD oversight

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Reps. Terri Sewell (AL-07) and Ron Kind (WI-3) introduced legislation Wednesday to empower Congress and the Department of Defense to ensure Section 232 tariffs are accurately applied to imports that threaten national security.

“Congress must reassert its trade authority and take steps to protect our manufacturers and farmers from the Trump administration’s reckless and isolationist trade policy,” **Sewell said**. “Alabama is home to auto manufacturers like Hyundai and Mercedes that employ nearly 40,000 hardworking men and women. The auto industry strengthens America; it doesn’t threaten it. I will continue to fight against the Trump administration’s misguided policies that threaten auto workers in Alabama.”

“This Administration’s go-it-alone approach of resolving our trade imbalances has sparked a trade war that is hurting Wisconsin farmers, workers, and families,” **Kind said**. “The National Security tariff process is being misused, at the cost of our rural and local economies. It is long-past time for Congress to reassert its constitutionally-granted power in our Nation’s trade policy and protect our export power.”

Currently, Section 232 of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962 gives the president authority to apply tariffs on imported goods or materials from other countries if those imports threaten national security.

The Trade Security Act would reform Section 232 to increase Congressional oversight in the Section 232 process and reassign national security threat assessments to the Department of Defense.

The Trump administration has proposed dramatically raising tariffs on auto imports – from 2.5 to 25 percent – under Section 232, despite [no evidence](#) that auto imports are a threat to national security.

The tariffs would deal a devastating blow to Alabama, where auto manufacturers are a powerful driver of the local economy. Assembly plants operated by Mercedes, Honda and Hyundai have made the state a hub for car and light truck production. In 2018, Alabama automakers combined to produce around one million cars and light trucks. Toyota, Honda and Hyundai also produced nearly 1.6 million engines in 2018, another sign of the sector’s strength in the state.

Specifically, the bill will:

- **Bifurcate the existing Section 232 process into an investigation phase, led by the Department of Defense, and a remedy phase, led by the Department of Commerce.** Splitting these responsibilities, while guaranteeing consultation between the two departments at all stages of the process, plays to each department’s strengths to ensure that the statute is used for genuine national security purposes.
- **Require the Department of Defense – instead of the Department of Commerce – to justify the national security basis for new tariffs under Section 232** and make the determination about the national security threat posed by imports of certain products. If a threat is found, the Department of Defense would

send its report to the president. In the event that the president desires to take action based on the finding of a national security threat, the president would then direct the Secretary of Commerce, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and the U.S. Trade Representative, to develop recommendations for how to respond to the threat. After receiving the recommendations of the Secretary of Commerce, the president would decide whether to take action.

- **Increase the role of Congress in the Section 232 process by expanding the process whereby Congress can disapprove of a Section 232 action by passing a joint resolution of disapproval.** Currently, Section 232 contains a disapproval resolution process limited only to the disapproval of actions on oil imports, which was inserted into Section 232 in 1980 by Congress in response to concerns about the misuse of the statute. This bill would expand the use of that disapproval resolution process to all types of products. The reformed disapproval process will only apply to future Section 232 actions.
- **Require consultation with Congress** throughout the Section 232 process.

Sen. Rob Portman (R-OH) introduced the Senate companion to the bill.

Rep. Sewell introduces Back Pay Fairness Act to reimburse federal workers, plus interest

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Reps. Terri Sewell (AL-07) and Dutch Ruppersberger (MD-2) introduced legislation today to provide back pay to federal workers impacted by the government shutdown – with interest.

“The Trump shutdown created significant financial insecurity for federal employees. Not only should the government pay back lost wages, it should work to reverse the real economic pain that will extend well into the future,” **Sewell explained**. “When taxpayers owe the federal government, interest accrues on late payments. There should be no difference when the federal government owes its hardworking employees.”

“My hope is that this bill will serve as a deterrent for future shutdowns: never again should our hardworking civil servants be used as political pawns,” **Ruppersberger said**. “But in the unfortunate event that we experience another government shutdown, this legislation will ensure employees will be able to recover from the painful – and long-lasting – impacts.”

When Congress voted to re-open the government in January, all impacted federal employees receive compensation for wages lost during the government shutdown. However, many federal workers were forced to incur additional costs associated with the shutdown, including late payments on bills and loans.

The Back Pay Fairness Act (H.R. 1051) would provide federal workers back pay with interest matched to the Treasury Prompt Payment policy, the same interest rate federal agencies pay on late payments to vendors and contractors. The legislation will retroactively apply to all government shutdowns after December 22, 2018 and provide future security by ensuring federal workers will receive due pay with accrued interest for all future shutdowns.

Since Sewell joined Congress in 2013, the government has shut down three times. Two of the three government shutdowns have occurred during the Trump administration. Most recently, the president’s demand for border wall funding closed the government for a record 35 days, causing hundreds of thousands of workers to miss two paychecks.

U.S. Sen. Doug Jones (D-AL) previously introduced the Paycheck Fairness Act in the Senate.

Rep. Terri Sewell appointed Chair of House Intelligence Subcommittee

Sewell to lead Subcommittee on Defense Intelligence and Warfighter Support

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Chairman of the House Intelligence Committee U.S. Rep. Adam Schiff (CA-28) announced today the subcommittee assignments for the 116th Congress. U.S. Rep. Terri Sewell (AL-07) will serve as the chairwoman of the Subcommittee on Defense Intelligence and Warfighter Support. In addition, Sewell will serve on the Subcommittee on Intelligence Modernization and Readiness.

“As the Chair of the Subcommittee on Defense Intelligence and Warfighter Support, I look forward to bringing my six years of experience on the Intelligence Committee to bear to advance and ensure our military readiness with respect to the accurate, timely and relevant dissemination of intelligence critical to our military operations,” **Sewell said**. “In this challenging time, it is more important than ever that we work actively to advance our defense intelligence capabilities and tactics to address the global threats to our national security.”

“The success of our nation’s intelligence operations depends on maximizing all of our resources across all of the 17 IC agencies. Our greatest asset is our people,” **Sewell said**. “I look forward to working with my colleagues on the Subcommittee on Intelligence Modernization and Readiness to continue to promote diversity and inclusion across the Intelligence Community to ensure our national security workforce is reflective of the rich diversity that makes our nation strong.”

Alabama has a robust national security presence in Huntsville, Anniston, Montgomery and the Wiregrass. The state is home to federally-recognized military and civilian leaders in the cyber security field and to Boeing, EADS, Lockheed Martin, Northrop Grumman and other numerous defense contractors and aerospace research companies that support thousands of jobs for citizens throughout the state.

Rep. Sewell Introduces Bipartisan Caribbean Trade Bill

Legislation extends the U.S. Caribbean Basin Trade Partnership Act through 2030

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Reps. Terri Sewell (D-AL) and Brad Wenstrup (R-OH) introduced legislation today to reauthorize the U.S. Caribbean Basin Trade Partnership Act (CBTPA) until 2030. Since 2000, CBTPA has allowed for the duty- and quota-free import of goods made with U.S. yarns, fabrics and threads from Caribbean countries.

“Extending the U.S. Caribbean Basin Trade Partnership Act will expand the United States’ trade with Caribbean basin countries and increase our nation’s economic growth,” **Sewell said.** “Improving trade with countries like Haiti and Jamaica by reauthorizing CBTPA encourages future investment, promotes job creation and lays the foundation for long-term economic development.”

“Since its establishment nearly twenty years ago, the CBPTA has provided the dual benefit of expanding U.S. exports while stimulating job growth and economic development in these Caribbean nations,” **Wenstrup said.** “It is my pleasure to join Rep. Sewell in maintaining these critical trade partnerships by extending the CBPTA for another ten years.”

The Caribbean Basin Economic Recovery Act would reauthorize the CBTPA until 2030, giving duty and quota-free access to apparel products manufactured in certain Caribbean countries. In return, CBTPA requires that Caribbean Basin countries use U.S. formed yarns, fabrics and thread. Eligible CBTPA countries include Barbados, Belize, Curacao, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, St. Lucia, and Trinidad and Tobago.

CBTPA works in conjunction with the Caribbean Basin Economic Recovery Act (CBERA) to facilitate the development of 17 independent countries of the Caribbean Basin region. For these two preferential trade programs to be effective, both CBTPA and CBERA must be authorized. Eligible CBERA countries include Antigua and Barbuda, Aruba, the Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, the British Virgin Islands, Curacao, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, Montserrat, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines and Trinidad and Tobago.

USDA Launches High-Speed Broadband

e-Connectivity Resource Guide

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6, 2019 – Assistant to the Secretary for Rural Development Anne Hazlett today announced the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has launched a new toolkit to help support the deployment of high-speed broadband e-Connectivity in rural communities.

“High-speed broadband e-Connectivity is becoming more and more essential to doing business, delivering health care, and, for schoolchildren, doing homework in rural communities,” Hazlett said. “This user-friendly tool will help rural customers find the many resources USDA has available to support the expansion and use of e-Connectivity in rural America.”

The [e-Connectivity Toolkit](#) features 27 USDA programs that support broadband deployment. The easy-to-use resource is a simple guide that allows customers to identify their type of eConnectivity project and locate resources the federal government offers for planning, equipment, construction, research and other e-Connectivity projects. Resources such as grants, loans and technical assistance are available from multiple Mission Areas at USDA, including Rural Development, National Institute of Food and Agriculture, Farm Service Agency, National Resources Conservation Service, and Forest Service.

The toolkit highlights examples of how e-Connectivity resources are being used to increase access to broadband services in rural communities. It is free and available to the public online, and can be easily printed for offline use.

USDA’s launch of the e-Connectivity Toolkit closely follows Secretary Sonny Perdue’s unveiling of the [ReConnect Program](#), a pilot program authorized by the Consolidated Budget Act of 2018, to facilitate broadband deployment in rural areas that lack sufficient access to broadband.

In April 2017, President Donald J. Trump established the Interagency Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Prosperity to identify legislative, regulatory and policy changes that could promote agriculture and prosperity in rural communities. In January 2018, Secretary Perdue presented the Task Force’s findings to President Trump. These findings included 31 recommendations to align the federal government with state, local and tribal governments to take advantage of opportunities that exist in rural America. Increasing investments in rural infrastructure is a key recommendation of the task force.

Sewell to bring Tiphonie Carter to State of the Union

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Rep. Terri Sewell (AL-07) today announced that Mrs. Tiphonie Carter, wife of fallen Birmingham Police Department Sgt. Wytasha Carter, will be her guest to the 2019 State of the Union address on Tuesday, February 5.

“This State of the Union I am honored to pay tribute to the bravery and sacrifices of our law enforcement officers. Sergeant Wytasha Carter was the kind of man that we all hope our sons grow up to be – a devoted and passionate father, husband, co-worker and member of the Birmingham community. His service truly represents the best of Alabama’s 7th District,” **Sewell said.** “I’m honored his wife Mrs. Tiphonie Carter will join me at the State of the Union. My congressional colleagues need to hear her story and act to prevent the senseless gun violence afflicting our communities.”

“I am blessed to be chosen to represent Alabama’s 7th District at the State of the Union. I am humbled by Representative Terri Sewell for honoring my husband Sergeant Wytasha Carter and his sacrifice to his community and law enforcement,” **Mrs. Carter said.** “This honoring provides comfort to our family in knowing his life’s work, service and sacrifice were not in vain. Thank you, Representative Sewell, for being a voice not only for my husband, but for the entire law enforcement family.”

During the early morning of January 13, 2019, Sgt. Carter was killed by a gunshot wound while working to protect the Birmingham community.

Sgt. Carter was raised in Birmingham and graduated from Phillips High School. After graduating from college, he served in the United States Air Force before beginning his law enforcement career in 2002 as a correctional officer with the Shelby County Sheriff’s office. Sgt. Carter served with the Birmingham Police Department for nearly eight years and was promoted to sergeant last year. He met Tiphonie, his wife of 21 years, while in the military.

Sgt. Carter and Tiphonie have two children: Dashae (24) and Taelen (15).

[Reps. Sewell, Larson introduce legislation to strengthen Social Security](#)

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Co-Chair of the Expand Social Security Caucus U.S. Rep. Terri Sewell (AL-07) and Chairman of the Ways & Means Social Security Subcommittee John Larson (CT-01) introduced legislation today to increase Social Security benefits and financially strengthen the Social Security program overall.

“Social Security should not only be protected, it should also be improved and expanded,” **Sewell said.** “Let’s be clear: Social Security is not an entitlement. It is a retirement plan that hardworking Americans earn and pay for throughout their careers.”

“Last year, Republicans passed a tax bill that will add over \$2 trillion to the deficit and lay the groundwork for cuts to Medicaid, Medicare and Social Security,” **Sewell said.** “I’m proud to partner with my Democratic colleagues to reverse that attack and strengthen these critically important social safety net programs.”

The Social Security 2100 Act provides the following:

- **An across-the-board benefit increase** for current and new beneficiaries, equivalent to about 2% of the average benefit. A modest boost in benefits strengthens the most reliable and universal leg of the retirement system.
- **An improved cost-of-living adjustment (COLA)** that takes into account the true costs incurred by seniors. This provision will help seniors who spend a greater portion of their income on health care and other necessities.
- **A stronger minimum benefit**, so someone who works their whole life does not retire into poverty. The new minimum benefit will be set at 25% above the poverty line.
- **A tax cut** for over 12 million Social Security recipients by eliminating the tax on their benefits. Currently, Social Security benefits are taxed if a person’s non-Social Security income exceeds \$25,000 for an individual or \$32,000 for couples. The bill would raise that threshold to \$50,000 and \$100,000 respectively.

Not only do over [1.1 million](#) Alabamians rely on Social Security, the program also lifted 437,878 Alabamians out of poverty in [2016](#). The program is sound policy and makes economic sense – it generates over [\\$23 billion](#) in economic output in Alabama alone.

With common sense steps like those in the Social Security 2100 Act, Congress can improve benefits while ensuring Social Security remains finally strong for the next generation to come.

Sewell statement on President's State of the Union address and Democratic response

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Rep. Sewell (AL-07) released the following statement in response to the President's State of the Union address:

“The President’s promises of bipartisanship and unity tonight ring hollow. Actions speak louder than words.

“Over and over, the Trump administration has pursued divisive and destructive policies that have failed the middle class. The President has attacked people with pre-existing conditions and American’s right to health care. He has put corporate interests above those of working families by passing the GOP tax scam and denying federal workers their hard-earned paychecks during the longest government shutdown in U.S. history. Day in and day out, the President has sowed a culture of fear and falsehoods and put his own personal interests above those of the American people.

“I am fighting every day to bring more opportunities and high-paying jobs to Alabama and I am proud to work with my colleagues this Congress on a bold agenda to deliver real results for the people of Alabama’s 7th District in a transparent, bipartisan and unifying way.

Sewell also addressed Stacey Abrams’ delivery of the Democratic response to the president’s speech:

“Stacey Abrams’ response to the State of the Union is historic – she is the first black woman to ever give a response to the president’s speech. As a young, black female, Stacey is truly the embodiment of the voters who made their voices heard in the 2018 election,” Sewell said. “Her vision for a brighter America stood in stark contrast to President Trump’s divisive rhetoric.”

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In honor of the record number of women serving in the 116th Congress, Sewell joined many of her colleagues in wearing “[suffragette white](#)” to the President’s address. Not only are there 127 current female members of Congress, the 535 members of the 116th Congress make up the most diverse congressional class in history.

“For the past 34 days, President Trump’s government shutdown has caused undue financial hardship on thousands of federal workers in my district and across the country while inflicting needless chaos and pain in the lives of all Americans. I am encouraged that the President finally agreed to re-open government today and to allow the process of negotiating funding bills to work,” **Sewell said.** “To be clear, it is never a good idea to shutdown government over policy disagreements. The American people deserve better from their elected officials. I look forward to working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle on passing long-term funding bills that reflect our shared values, respect our workers and invest in smart, effective border security measures.”

Sewell highlights local impact of government shutdown

Thursday marks day 34 of the shutdown

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Rep. Terri Sewell (AL-07) took to the House floor today to highlight the impact the government shutdown is having on residents in Alabama’s 7th Congressional District.

“We heard the story of Heather Bryant, who is struggling to pay for the gas she needs to drive the 30 minutes to work. In the small community of Aliceville, Alabama, the federal women's correctional facility is a major employer,” **Sewell said.** “I want you to know that because of the 35 days that these correctional officers, parole officers, prison workers have gone without pay, that we have seen restaurants closed, we have seen convenient stores reduce hours in that community.”

“As Martin Luther King also said, ‘The time is always ripe to do what’s right.’ What is right, Madam Speaker, is to reopen government now. We must stand with these federal workers. We must unabashedly demand they get paid, and we must seek ways to work across the aisle to get government open,” **Sewell said.** “But they have to also offer an olive branch. This President hasn't done that. Instead, he's put his interests over the American people's interests.”

Earlier today, Sewell’s staff [provided lunch](#) to some of the 300 corrections workers employed at the federal prison in Aliceville, Alabama. Earlier this week, Sewell provided breakfast lunch to TSA officers at the Montgomery Regional and Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airports. These acts from the community help, Sewell said, but they are not enough.

Senate expected to take up House-passed bill Thursday

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Rep. Terri Sewell (AL-07) cast her tenth vote Wednesday to re-open the government and ensure federal workers are guaranteed the pay they are due.

“I have voted ten times to re-open our government since Congress convened on January 3rd,” **Sewell said.** “On Friday, many of our federal workers will miss their second paycheck. The President and Senator Mitch McConnell may not understand what missing a single paycheck means – let alone two – but for many in Alabama’s 7th District and around the country, their failure to act is absolutely devastating.”

“I have met with federal workers in my district who are depending on us to do our jobs and re-open the government as soon as possible,” **Sewell said.** “I am calling on Senate Republicans to put partisan politics aside and vote on the House bills we passed so that our federal workers get the pay they are due.”

Earlier this week, Sewell heard directly from some of the 800,000 federal workers impacted by the shutdown. She met with TSA employees at both the Montgomery Regional and Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airports who have been working without pay for nearly a month as a result of the Trump government shutdown. Sewell provided the TSA officers with breakfast and lunch to thank them for their hard work despite the difficult circumstances.

Late Tuesday, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) announced the Senate will vote on House-passed legislation on Thursday, marking the first votes the Republican-controlled Senate will take to re-open the government.

Selma Time-Journal Op-Ed: Our Federal Workers are not political pawns, Mr. President.

Americans deserve a well-functioning Congress that works on their behalf. I know my constituents in Alabama's 7th District did not send me to Washington to be a party to the problem, but to seek solutions. That is why I am working every day to reopen government and allow hardworking federal employees to work and ensure government services continue uninterrupted.

I voted to re-open the government and fund border security the moment Congress went into session on Jan. 3. Since then, I have voted an additional eight times to ensure our federal workers receive their due pay government gets back to work.

To be clear, I support investing in our nation's border security. Just last summer, I voted for \$1.6 billion to enhance our existing border security infrastructure and supported a bipartisan proposal to implement smart measures to ensure our Customs and Border Protection agents have the resources needed to effectively police the southern border. In July 2018, I went to the Texas border, toured detention centers and a port of entry, and met with border patrol agents there.

Democrats and Republicans agree: we need to invest in our strategic infrastructure – state-of-the-art technologies to detect tunnels; sensors and radars to spot moving people and objects; and drones equipped with the technology to surveil areas that otherwise would be difficult to monitor. Equally as important, we need to provide adequate resources to combat the entry of terrorists and criminals into our country through our airports and other borders.

So, when the President says that Democrats are against securing our southern border, he is being dishonest. However, real border security will not come in the form of a medieval brick-and-mortar wall. What Republicans and the President do not seem to understand is that the irresponsible Trump shutdown is impacting the wellbeing of over 800,000 federal workers and their families who depend on a steady paycheck, and countless others who depend on essential government services affected by the shutdown.

For example, the Federal Bureau of Prisons is the largest employer in Pickens County, AL, which is located in my district. Those federal corrections officers are worried about being able to pay their monthly expenses, like their mortgages and essential health care costs. We also have countless other federal agencies impacted by the shutdown, including TSA, which impacts hardworking men and women in our airports, like agents in our Birmingham and Montgomery airports.

The negative side effects go on. The shutdown is having a rippling effect on local businesses all over the country, including those in the urban and rural parts of our district that depend on federal workers to keep their businesses open. Additionally, over 800,000 Alabamians rely on SNAP benefits to feed their families. If the shutdown continues, too many will be left without the support they need to put food on the table.

While it's difficult for President Trump to understand why the average American can't go without pay, the reality in Alabama is that many of my constituents live paycheck-to-paycheck regardless of how hard they work. Many

are one financial emergency away from financial ruin. It is irresponsible that this Trump shutdown, now the longest in history, was completely avoidable. The status quo is unacceptable. Federal workers are not political pawns.

I will continue to work with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to find a real path forward, but we need a willing partner in the White House who appreciates the hardship he is causing everyday Americans. It's time for President Trump and Sen. Mitch McConnell to put politics aside and take up the House-passed bills to end the shutdown NOW! Our communities and workers deserve better. Our nation deserves better.

Proposals for full-scale technical efforts leading to development/deployment should be directed to other appropriate NSF programs. Integrative and accelerative approaches. Proposals are particularly welcomed that address identified common needs across multiple research disciplines; leverage and accelerate the impact of existing CI investments in resources and services in one or more application domains; aim to reduce barriers to broader adoption of CI-enabled science/engineering approaches; and integrate different aspects and elements of CI to achieve holistic solutions with transformative science/engineering impact. Past Recipients of WWSDP grants are eligible to apply and compete for FY2019 WWSDP grants; however, applications for renewal or supplementation of existing awards will not be considered. The WWSDP is limited to nonprofit organizations subject to 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3) of the tax code. Applicants must be nonprofit organizations who have been established for the purpose of training and providing service dogs. Pass-through entities will not be considered. Organizations should be able to tailor a comprehensive plan to establish and operate a program to provide assistance dogs to Service Members and/or

Veterans with disabilities. An applicant's failure to meet eligibility criteria by the application deadline will preclude USU from making an award to the applicant.

[FY2019 Office of Naval Research Historically Black Colleges and Universities/Minority Institutions \(HBCU/MI\) Program – \(CFDA 12.300\)](#)

The Department of Navy (DoN) Historically Black Colleges and Universities/Minority Institutions (HBCU/MI) Program aims to increase the quantity and quality of minority professionals in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) in the defense community. Research conducted at Minority-Serving Institutions (MSIs) for the DoN HBCU/MI Program:

- Enhances the research and educational capabilities of HBCU/MIs in scientific and engineering disciplines critical to the defense mission of the DoN,
- Encourages cross-institutional, collaborative participation of HBCU/MIs in naval-relevant research, development, testing, and evaluation (RDT&E), and
- Increases the engagement of students, including underrepresented minorities, in STEM fields important to the defense mission.

This FOA is executed under policy and guidance of the DoN HBCU/MI Program and is administered by the Office of Naval Research (ONR). This FOA seeks to support research efforts that will contribute to the science and technology (S&T) mission and vision of the U.S. Navy and the U.S. Marine Corps while simultaneously expanding the research capacity of participant institutions and engaging students in STEM. In that regard, this FOA is intended for white papers and invited proposals from HBCU/MIs exploring basic, naval-relevant research. The technical content of any idea must align with the following research areas of interest as outlined by the Naval Research Development Framework.

Information, Cyber, and Spectrum Superiority An increasingly interconnected force with more rapid and effective decision-making is enabled by persistent sensing, advanced data analytics, digital integration, and assured spectrum access. In that regard, this research area spans three strategic areas:

- Assured Command and Control (C2)
- Electromagnetic Maneuver Warfare (EMW)
- Full Spectrum Cyber technologies

Assured Command and Control (C2): Assured C2 is enabled by persistent sensing, timely intelligence, and decision support tools that will accelerate “data to decisions” timelines. Leveraging machine reasoning and data analytics, an end-to-end approach achieves protected data transport, resilient networking, and assured apps and services that result in trusted information and actions. The need for increased spectral efficiency and diversity, coupled with the information domain, is critical to our naval freedom of maneuver on a global scale.

Electromagnetic Maneuver Warfare (EMW): EMW efforts include electromagnetic spectrum management technologies and techniques that fluidly combine communications, surveillance electronic warfare (EW), and electronics to understand and shape the battlespace. Ultra-wide bank systems, which continuously monitor the spectrum, are needed to facilitate optimized use. Intrinsically secure and resilient computing systems with robust computational and communications architectures will provide the capability to manipulate and interpret rapidly growing amounts of data support of C2, Combat Systems (CS), and Intelligence Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR) effects. Assuring secure access to the full spectrum is essential to operate at will or deny adversary access in more complex and dynamic future EMW environments.

Full Spectrum Cyber technologies: Full-spectrum Cyber approaches must be developed to protect our networks, data, information systems, and real-time control systems. Total platform cyber protection is becoming an essential element of Information Warfare. Cyber technologies provide the ability to assess and counter potential threats. Future information systems must provide agile capabilities for achieving and maintaining communications and data integrity in rapidly evolving, dispersed, and disadvantaged environments. Computational architectures need more resilient information infrastructure through assured system design, automated defensive tools for advanced

persistent threats, hardening of the hosts, and data assurance. Applicable Research Interests: • Advanced RF electronics and materials • Communications and networking • Computational methods for decision making • Data science and analytics • Electronic warfare • Sensors and sensor processing • Machine learning, reasoning, and intelligence • Resource optimization • Precision navigation and timekeeping

Mission Capable, Persistent, and Survivable Sea Platforms Concepts, systems, and component technologies that improve the performance and survivability of naval ships/submarines in an increasingly distributed yet interconnected force are critical. New platforms will need to deliver advanced weapons, as well as increased mobility and survivability. Power and energy for surface ships is a key, enduring investment for the efficiency of legacy platforms, while enabling the power requirements of future electric weapons. High-power electric weapons and sensors have advanced significantly, creating technical requirements for dramatic increases in energy management and pulsed power. Computational tools that model the platform's interaction with the anticipated operational environment are essential to the development of integrated designs and protections such as stealth, counter-directed energy weapons, tactical decision aids, electronic warfare, and hard-kill systems. Undersea dominance remains a priority as the Navy designs and builds the next generation of strategic and tactical submarines. Resurgence by peer adversaries in ultra-quiet submarine technology is closing the gap in undersea warfare. Platform mobility and survivability is critical to successful operational strategies calling for more distributed forces. Advancements in materials, acoustics, and intelligent control are required in addition to hydro-, electro-, and computational mechanics. Advancements in countermeasures for ships and submarines are also critical. Platforms will become more self-sustaining to extend endurance and forward presence while reducing the logistics tail for fuel. Future platforms must have reduced sustainment requirements and be easier to maintain. Efforts are focused on platform interfaces as well as platform efficiency to reduce sustainment needs. Enhanced interface standards and modularity provide flexibility, ease of maintenance, and upgrades. Finally, affordability permeates all modernization concepts. The development of validated design tools capable of rapidly and accurately analyzing and evaluating novel platforms with advanced system performance characteristics is a high priority. Applicable Research Interests: • Naval engineering • Advanced naval power systems • Advanced survivable sea platforms • Unmanned sea platforms, autonomy, and power • Advanced naval materials • Undersea weapons, counter-weapons, and energetics • Sea platform environmental quality • Corrosion control

Aviation, Force Projection, and Integrated Defense Sea-based aviation, including platform and weapons research, is focused on new or enhanced capabilities to defend against, and/or deter, disable, damage, defeat, or destroy adversaries at extended ranges and speeds. Offsetting technologies must continue to provide naval forces with an edge in any future battle. In the future battlespace, electric weapons with deep magazines and low cost-per-kill will be required to engage large numbers of threats simultaneously. Directed-energy systems will be used in layered defense to counter ISR capabilities, defeat or destroy threats, both before and during combat. Networked weapons will improve the probability to kill and reduce the need for multiple weapons targeting the same platform. Advanced warhead materials will decrease the size of rounds. Electromagnetic realigns will allow more, smaller, and longer-range rounds. Future naval fires efforts include targeting, decision support and precision strike by air, surface, undersea, and expeditionary forces. Improved aerodynamic control will allow unprecedented maneuverability for unconventional aircraft designs. Advanced aircraft power and propulsion technologies, such as variable-cycle advanced technology, will provide more efficient operation over a wider range of flight conditions. They will also enable technologies for providing the power and thermal management of electric weapons for next-generation aircraft. Advances in structures and materials will allow for reduced life-cycle costs as well as stronger and lighter airframes. Autonomous systems will reduce operational risk and improve mission performance. For today's missions, autonomy can improve manning effectiveness and provide options for mission tasks. For future

missions, autonomy can provide new persistent, pervasive, and rapid response capabilities to do tasks that would be unaffordable or impractical today.

The Administration for Children and Families, Administration on Children, Youth and Families, Family and Youth Services Bureau support organizations and communities that work every day to put an end to youth homelessness, adolescent pregnancy, and domestic violence. The purpose of the Basic Center Program (BCP) is to provide temporary shelter and counseling services to youth who have left home without permission of their parents or guardians, have been forced to leave home, or other homeless youth who might otherwise end up in law enforcement, child welfare, mental health, or juvenile justice systems. The BCPs work to establish or strengthen community-based programs that meet the immediate needs of runaway and homeless youth and their families. BCPs provide youth under 18 years of age with emergency shelter, food, clothing, counseling and referrals for health care. BCPs can provide up to 21 days of shelter for youth and seeks to reunite young people with their families, whenever possible, or to locate appropriate alternative placements. Additional services may include: street-based services; home-based services for families with youth at risk of separation from the family; drug abuse education and prevention services; and at the request of runaway and homeless youth, testing for sexually transmitted diseases. The Administration for Children and Families, Administration on Children, Youth and Families; Family and Youth Services Bureau announces the availability of funds under the Street Outreach Program (SOP). State or regional networks of pediatric mental health care teams will provide tele-consultation, training, technical assistance, and care coordination for pediatric primary care providers to diagnose, treat and refer children with behavioral health conditions. For purposes of this funding opportunity, telehealth is defined as the use of electronic information and telecommunication technologies to support and promote long-distance clinical consultation, patient and professional health-related education, public health and health administration. Permitted telehealth modalities between providers include (but are not limited to): real-time video, telephonic communications, store and forward of images and mobile health (mHealth) applications. [Grants to Support New Investigators in Addressing Cross-Cutting Violence Prevention and Opioid Overdose Prevention – \(CFDA 93.136\)](#)

The National Center for Injury and Prevention Control (NCIPC) intends to provide support and 75% “protected time” for an intensive, supervised (mentored) career development experience to develop new researchers in the fields of opioid overdose prevention and cross-cutting violence prevention. The intent is to provide resources to young investigators so they can grow their skills by developing and conducting research efforts needed to address NCIPC Research Priorities (<https://www.cdc.gov/injury/researchpriorities/index.html>), with the potential to investigate new and emerging public health issues. Investigators focused on opioid overdose prevention must propose a research project to investigate risk factors for and strategies to prevent opioid overdose. Investigators may address one of the research gaps identified in the NCIPC Research Priorities (<https://www.cdc.gov/injury/researchpriorities/index.html>). Beyond the areas explicitly stated in the Research Priorities, research questions of interest to NCIPC include: How can PDMP, coroner, medical examiner, and law enforcement data be used to identify risk and protective factors for opioid overdose? What are the patterns of co-use of prescription opioids and heroin, injection of opioids, and overdose? What strategies are most effective at improving use of prescription drug monitoring programs? What levers can be used to support providers and health systems in improving prescribing, pain management, and overdose response, while minimizing unintended consequences? How can public health systems be improved to support linkage to care for opioid use disorder and overdose? What public health approaches can be infused into public safety efforts and law enforcement response to improve health outcomes? How can individuals be empowered to make safer choices about opioid use? It is expected that the research could be directly translated to inform strategies being implemented by state and local health departments in addressing the opioid overdose epidemic. Investigators focused on cross-cutting violence prevention must assess multiple forms of violence impacting children or youth (i.e., child abuse and neglect, youth violence, teen dating violence and self-directed violence). Exposure to violence and other adverse childhood experiences can negatively affect health and development across the lifespan. CDC's Preventing Multiple Forms

of Violence: A Strategic Vision for Connecting the Dots emphasizes the strategic importance of prevention strategies that address multiple forms of violence (https://www.cdc.gov/violenceprevention/pdf/strategic_vision.pdf). Investigators focused on preventing multiple forms of violence impacting children or youth must address at least one of the cross-cutting violence prevention research gaps identified in the NCIPC Research Priorities (<https://www.cdc.gov/injury/researchpriorities/index.html>) in the context of children or youth. These gaps include the need to: identify modifiable factors that buffer against adversity and aggressive behavior in childhood to reduce multiple forms of violence and enhance positive health outcomes; evaluate the effectiveness and economic efficiency of policies or community-level change strategies designed to enhance the economic and social environment to reduce multiple forms of violence impacting children and youth; evaluate the effectiveness and economic efficiency of early education and support for young children and their families to prevent multiple forms of violence; evaluate the effectiveness and economic efficiency of programs, policies, and practices to enhance young people's skills and relationships that reduce their involvement in multiple forms of violence; and evaluate the effectiveness of dissemination and implementation strategies for child/youth violence prevention and assess factors that accelerate adoption of evidence-based strategies.

In addition to coordinating a national strategy for these community-level transformation efforts, the COE will create and implement a national strategy to assist states and CSBG eligible entities in identifying appropriate outcome measures within the CSBG National Performance Indicators. As necessary to support improved community outcomes, the COE may identify and support ongoing efforts to assure accountability and performance management by assisting State CSBG Lead Agencies, State Community Action Agency (CAA) Associations, and local CSBG-eligible entities in meeting high organizational performance standards in the areas of consumer input and involvement, community engagement, community

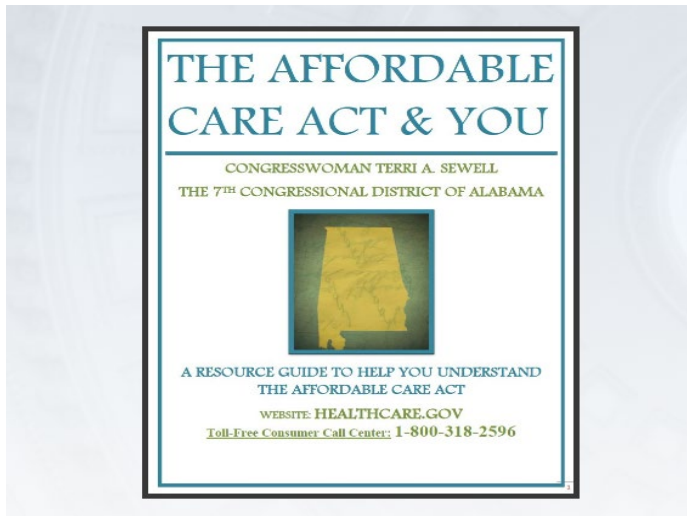

The AHF awards grants solely to support public humanities projects. Active public participation, involvement of humanities scholars, and strong humanities content are the three essential components of AHF-funded projects.

The fund is administered by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, in partnership with Alabama Trust for Historic Preservation. FACT SHEET: Veterans Employment Center

The online Veterans Employment Center is the single federal source for Veterans looking for new career opportunities in the private and public sectors, as well as Service Members transitioning to the civilian workforce, military and Veteran spouses and dependents looking for employment opportunities, GI Bill beneficiaries transitioning from training to the job market and employers looking to connect with high quality applicants. It is the first interagency tool that brings together public and private job opportunities with resume building and other career tools currently offered on a variety of websites together in one place.

Through the online Veterans Employment Center, Veterans, transitioning Service Members and spouses are connected to high quality career choices by matching their identified skills with available public and private job opportunities. The site is built using an open application programming interface (API) to attract private sector innovation.

- Quick public resume posting with an instant connection to thousands of public and private employers
- Target job search based on specific, high-demand career paths
- Single search for both public and private sector positions
- Military skills translator and resume generator
- Social media integration with popular bookmarking sites for saving job postings

- View reverse skills translation (military to civilian skills) for applicants
- Set Veterans hiring goals and track progress
- Connect to resources designed to help recruit and retain talented, Veteran employees

In connection with the First Lady and Dr. Biden's Joining Forces initiative, the Department of Veterans Affairs worked with the Departments of Defense, Labor, and Education, and the Office of Personnel Management to design and develop the site and incorporate features of existing online employment tools at each agency. The result is an upgrade to the existing Veterans Job Bank and an integrated solution connecting Veterans, transitioning Service Members and employers.

Employers, Veterans and transitioning Service Members deserve a single, authoritative source for connecting to each other. Now that the core tools and an integrated search function exist in one single location, each agency is engaged in minimizing duplication and redundancy of current sites and services.
