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## Rep. Sewell to Unveil Stronger Consumer Borrower Protections

Washington, D.C. -- Congresswoman Terri Sewell will soon introduce legislation to better protect consumers as a follow-up to President Obama's March visit to Birmingham where he outlined the stronger need for payday lending requirements.

Today, Congresswoman Sewell outlined the urgent need for reform on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives. Thank you Mr./Madam Speaker,

Today I rise to talk about the critical need for stronger oversight of payday lenders.

In March, I welcomed President Obama to the City of Birmingham in my district, where he highlighted our nation's economic recovery and put a spotlight on the area that needed most improvement. The President highlighted the urgent need for better regulation of the payday lending industry the very same day that the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau unveiled proposals to rein in this loosely-regulated industry.

I hope that my colleagues will join me in supporting the CFPB's efforts to ensure that these products help -- not harm -- consumers. The payday lending and title loan industry must take steps to ensure that borrowers understand the loan terms and have the resources to pay them back.

In my district, the proliferation of payday lending is really unacceptable. On every corner, you will find a payday lender. In fact the President quoted that there were more payday lending institutions in my district than there were McDonald's.

These borrowers are disproportionately African American or Latino – two communities that were severely impacted by the predatory lending practices – and far too many of these borrowers find themselves trapped in a cycle of debt.

In the coming weeks, I plan to introduce a bill and to spearhead efforts led by consumer industry groups to protect consumers from predatory lending. I ask my colleagues to join me. These good people are my constituents, and not this industry's prey.

## The Preserving Access to Manufactured Housing Act Passes in the House

Washington, D.C. -- Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement after the Preserving Access to Manufactured Housing Act (H.R. 650), a bill she co-sponsored to preserve critical access to financing for manufactured homes for low-income and rural families, passed the U.S. House of Representatives.

"Manufactured homes provide quality, affordable housing for roughly 22 million Americans. More than 300,000 Alabama families live in manufactured homes, which accounts for over 14 percent of the state's available housing stock.

"The Preserving Access to Manufactured Housing Act ensures that manufactured homes remain a viable, affordable housing option for families in rural, distressed and underserved areas. Manufactured homes loans are considered personal property loans, which distinguishes them from traditional mortgages.

"The Dodd Frank Act was meant to enhance consumer protections, rather than limit consumer access. This bill corrects an unintended consequence of Dodd Frank and makes a simple but necessary adjustment to enable lenders to meet the demand for affordable, responsible mortgage loans for manufactured homes while preserving important consumer protections.

"This bill leaves untouched important protections established under the Dodd Frank Act. Consumers will continue to have a wide range of mortgage protections, including the Qualified Mortgage Standards 'Ability to Repay' requirement, the prohibition on steering incentives, the prohibition against steering a consumer to a predatory loan, loan term disclosures, the prohibition on mandatory arbitration, as well as other state and federal laws.

"Without this bill, working families and retirees with limited credit or fixed incomes will be forced into more expensive housing options. I am proud of the bipartisan support the Preserving Access to Manufactured Housing Act received in the House. Today's vote underscores our commitment to preserving affordable housing choices for all Americans."

## **Rep. Sewell Introduces Expanded Child Care Credits for Working Families**

Washington, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri Sewell introduced the Helping Working Families Afford Child Care Act of 2015 (H.R. 1780), to make quality child care more affordable for millions of working-class families.

"Access to affordable, quality child care should not be a financial hurdle that proves too high for working families to cross. Families living below the federal poverty level spend, on average, one-third of their income on child care expenses.

"The Helping Working Families Afford Child Care Act would make child care more affordable for millions of working parents by increasing child care tax credits and making the credit fully refundable for low-income families.

"Expanding child care tax credits will boost our economy, and provide working parents with the security they need to care for their families. I look forward to working with my colleagues in both the House and the Senate to provide much needed relief for working families."

#### **Highlights of the Bill**

The Helping Working Families Afford Child Care Act of 2015 will modernize the Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit (CDCTC), enacted in 1976, by expanding the size and scope of child care tax credits.

The Helping Working Families Afford Child Care Act increases the amount of eligible child care expenses to \$8,000 for one child or \$16,000 for two or more children, up from \$3,000 for one child and \$6,000 for two or more children under the CDCTC.

Working class families would be eligible for tax credits of \$2,800 or \$5,600, depending on the number of children for whom they incur qualifying expenses.

Working parents who currently receive no benefits from existing child care tax credits -because their income is too low -- would be eligible for a federal refund under the Helping Working Families Afford Child Care Act.

U.S. Senator Patty Murray (WA), the Ranking Member of the Senate Health, Education, Labor & Pensions (HELP) Committee, introduced the companion bill in the Senate.

# **Reps. Sewell and Byrne Reintroduce the Workforce Development Tax Credit Act**

Washington, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri Sewell (AL-7) and Congressman Bradley Byrne (AL-1) reintroduced the Workforce Development Tax Credit Act (H.R. 1781), a bipartisan bill that prepares our workforce for manufacturing jobs by providing federal tax credits for businesses that offer apprenticeship programs and additional tax credits for companies that hire apprentices.

The Manufacturing Institute says nearly 3.5 million manufacturing jobs will need to be filled over the next decade; however, approximately 2 million of those jobs will go unfilled due to a skilled labor shortage.

"A strong manufacturing sector is crucial for our nation's economic growth and prosperity. The Workforce Development Tax Credit Act encourages businesses to work with community colleges and universities to develop apprenticeship programs that will lead to more skilled workers. Emphasizing skills training will enable our country to maintain its competitive edge, and help bring more Americans into the middle class. I am proud to sponsor this bill with Bradley Byrne, my friend and fellow Alabamian, and I look forward to its passage," said **Rep. Sewell**.

"The workforce needs in the United States are rapidly changing, and skills training is becoming more important than ever before. That's why I am proud to join my friend and colleague Terri Sewell in introducing the Workforce Development Tax Credit Act. By encouraging businesses to partner with community colleges and universities to advance workforce training initiatives, we can help connect Americans with the skills they need to get a job and meet growing industry demands," **Rep. Byrne**.

"The Workforce Development Tax Credit Act is in total alignment with the goals of the Alabama Workforce Investment Board and with the recommendations made by the Alabama Workforce Council regarding public/private partnerships," said **George Clark**, President of Manufacture Alabama, Chairman of the Alabama Workforce Investment Board, and Vice-Chairman of the Alabama Workforce Council.

Reps. Chris Van Hollen (MD-8), Joseph Crowley (NY-14), Tim Ryan (OH-17), Raul Ruiz (CA-36) and John Carney (DE-At Large) are original co-sponsors of the bill.

"Apprenticeship programs are a critical tool to bridge the skills gap and help employers train and hire workers for jobs that strengthen our economy," said **Rep. Van Hollen**, Ranking Member of the House Budget Committee. "I am proud to stand with Representatives Sewell and Byrne and support this common-sense approach to incentivize apprenticeships and help connect workers to good-paying jobs in my home state of Maryland and across the country."

"Apprenticeships are an effective method for giving Americans the specified, hands-on experience they need in order to obtain a secure, good-paying job," said **Rep. Joe Crowley**, Vice Chair of the Democratic Caucus. "We should do everything we can to incentivize the creation of these programs, which have a demonstrated record of success. I'm proud to join Reps. Sewell and Byrne in introducing this critical legislation."

"Manufacturing is the backbone of the American economy, but in order for this industry to continue to grow and thrive we must have a skilled workforce. That is why I am happy to join my colleagues in introducing the bipartisan Workforce Development Tax Credit Act. This legislation will ensure that we have apprenticeship programs to prepare our young people for today's job market. This tax credit will help us remain a world leader and on the cutting edge in manufacturing," said **Rep. Ryan**.

"Since I first came to Congress, reinvigorating the manufacturing sector has been among my top priorities. The revitalization of the manufacturing sector is essential to creating stronger economic growth and securing the financial future of working families. I am proud to join colleagues on both sides of the aisle in co-sponsoring the Workforce Development Tax Credit Act, which creates fruitful new partnerships between the business community and institutions of higher learning to provide new training and apprenticeship opportunities, and to help address the industry's need for more skilled labor," said **Rep. Carney**.

#### Highlights of the Bill

The Workforce Development Tax Credit Act of 2015 would close the skill gap and encourage job creation by providing federal tax credits to employers that create apprenticeship programs. An additional tax credit is offered to businesses that subsequently hire and retain apprentices for at least one year post-apprenticeship.

The goals of this bill are to train workers for skilled manufacturing jobs, assist companies in creating recruitment pipelines and decreasing costly turnover, and provide incentives for businesses to manufacture in America.

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### **National Park Service Awards Historic Preservation Grants**

WASHINGTON – National Park Service Director Jonathan B. Jarvis announced today the distribution of \$46,925,000 for historic preservation grants to the 50 States, the District of Columbia, the U.S. Territories, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau. These funds were appropriated under the Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act, 2015, enacted as Public Law 113-235.

"In partnership with the States and Territories, the National Park Service is committed to preserving our nation's important historic and cultural places, using important tools like these historic preservation grants," said Jarvis. "Looking ahead to the National Park Service's Centennial in 2016, we are committed to telling a more complete and diverse story of America's history in our second century, and this grant program helps us accomplish that goal."

Grants may be used for a broad range of activities such as historic property inventories, resource protection planning, nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, monitoring compliance with Federal historic preservation requirements, technical assistance to private interests that seek to preserve and protect historic resources, assisting local government preservation programs, and acquisition or development of historic properties

The National Park Service will administer these funds as part of the Historic Preservation Fund. Amounts made available to each jurisdiction are listed on the next page.





The online Veterans Employment Center is the single federal source for Veterans looking for new career opportunities in the private and public sectors, as well as Service Members transitioning to the civilian workforce, military and Veteran spouses and dependents looking for employment opportunities, GI Bill beneficiaries transitioning from training to the job market and employers looking to connect with high quality applicants. It is the first interagency tool that brings together public and private job opportunities with resume building and other career tools currently offered on a variety of websites together in one place.

Through the online Veterans Employment Center, Veterans, transitioning Service Members and spouses are connected to high quality career choices by matching their identified skills with available public and private job opportunities. The site is built using an open application programming interface (API) to attract private sector innovation.
