



The Department of Justice (DOJ) grant making components—the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS Office), the Office of Justice Programs (OJP), and the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)—have established this website to serve as a resource hub for their grants management system (JustGrants) and payment management system (ASAP), both of which launched on October 15, 2020.



What Is JustGrants?

JustGrants replaces the Grants Management System (GMS) used by the Office of Justice Programs (OJP) and the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), as well as the NexGen system used by the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS Office).

Office of Community Oriented Policing Services

- Established by the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994.
- Mission is to advance public safety through community policing.
- Community policing focuses on collaborative efforts to prevent and respond to crime, social disorder, and fear of crime.
- Since 1994, the COPS Office has invested more than \$15 billion to add community policing officers to the nation's streets, enhance crime fighting technology, support crime prevention initiatives, and provide training and technical assistance to help advance community policing.
- The COPS Office has funded more than 130,000 additional officers to more than 13,600 of the nation's 18,000 law enforcement agencies across the country in small and large jurisdictions alike.



Depleted Hiring Resources Through COPS

- In 2009, COPS received 7,272 COPS Hiring Program applications requesting approximately \$8.3 billion for 39,346 officers. However, we were able to fund only 1,046 of those applications for 4,699 officers with the \$1 billion available.
- In 2013, COPS received 1,718 applications requesting over \$970 million and were only able to make 266 awards for 955 officers.
- In 2014, COPS funded only 215 applications of the 1,296 that were submitted. COPS received funding requests of more than \$425 million for the \$123 million that was available.
- In 2020, COPS awarded nearly \$400 million dollars to 605 agencies out of the approximate 1,100 that were submitted. These awards allowed an additional 2,761 additional full-time law enforcement professionals to be hired.

Recent COPS Funding to Alabama

- FY20 COPS Hiring Program awarded a combined 58 officer positions to Alexander City, DeKalb County, Falkville, Helena, Madison County, Mobile, Montevallo, Montgomery County, Satsuma, Tarrant, and Troy.
- Cherokee County received a COPS youth engagement microgrant for \$15,090 in FY20.
- The School Violence Prevention Program awarded funding to Alabaster in FY20, as well as ALEA and Mobile in FY18.
- In FY20 ADOC received a COPS Law Enforcement Mental Health and Wellness Act award.
- In FY19, FY18 the National Association of School Resource Officers were awarded a Community Policing Development Award.
- Alabama has been unsuccessful in obtaining COPS funding for Anti-Heroin and Anti-Meth awards due to an absence of applications.

ABOUT OVW GRANT PROGRAMS

The Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) currently administers 19 grant programs authorized by the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) of 1994 and subsequent legislation. Four programs are "formula," meaning the enacting legislation specifies how the funds are to be distributed. The remaining programs are "discretionary," meaning OVW is responsible for creating program parameters, qualifications, eligibility, and deliverables in accordance with authorizing legislation. These grant programs are designed to develop the nation's capacity to reduce domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking by strengthening services to victims and holding offenders accountable.





OJJDP Funding

OJJDP strives to strengthen the juvenile justice system's efforts to protect public safety, hold justice-involved youth appropriately accountable, and provide services that address the needs of youth and their families.





OJJDP Funding in Alabama

Since 2015, there have been 33 OJJDP award made to Alabama agencies, amounting to \$21,954,286.

Current ADECA OJJDP Funding

The Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs will allocate FY 2020 Title II Formula Grant funds (~\$776k) to local government agencies and nonprofit organizations to implement projects that focus on community-based programs that work with juveniles and their families to address issues within the family that may be a causative factor in a juvenile's delinquent behavior. Projects will address issues such as effective communication, discipline, substance abuse, physical and emotional abuse, mental health issues, education, job skills training, and the cyclical histories of illiteracy, unemployment and involvement in the criminal justice system. Funding will be utilized to address compliance with the four Core Requirements, specifically, deinstitutionalization of status offenders, sight and sound separation, jail removal, and compliance monitoring.

Reentry Projects - \$90 million awarded in FY20

Provide the opportunity for community and faith-based organizations, states, and local governments to improve outcomes for young adults between the ages of 18 to 24 that have been involved in the juvenile or adult justice system, and adults age 25 and older who have been incarcerated in the adult criminal justice system and released from prison or jail within 180 days. The projects offer a range of services based on current evidence and proven research, as well as promising emerging practices which test interventions that improve employment outcomes. The grants operate in rural and urban areas, and must serve high-crime, high-poverty communities. (ending September 2022)

Tips for Preparing Successful Grant Applications

- Ensure your online registrations, passwords, etc. (e.g., Grants.gov, GMS, COPS website, etc.) are current!
- Start the application and submission process as early as possible
- Thoroughly read solicitation, call for concept papers, request for proposals, etc.
- Include a research partner in your grant proposal
- Call or email the point of contact if you have questions
- Ensure complete compliance with current grants (progress reports, Federal Financial Reports, past audit or site visit issues are resolved, etc.).
- Narrative sections should be well-written and should address all relevant sections/questions
- Use the application checklists and follow instructions to the letter
- Complete all sections and ensure accuracy of the information
- Ensure that all contact information is current, especially email addresses, as this is how we alert you of solicitation openings and closings
- Print and keep copies of all online grant applications



Tips for Preparing Successful Grant Applications

- Plan ahead, have an idea of what you want/need beforehand
- Partner with others, but not too many
- Work as a team, but have defined roles and expectations
- Strongly consider bringing in a research partner
- Read and re-read the application carefully, so as not to make a careless error
- Mirror the language and priorities of the awarding agency
- Be ambitious, but realistic and incremental
- If you have a question, ask the agency
- APPLY
- Reapply the next year



Grant Realism

- Grants are not a panacea, but are ideal as catalysts or supplements
- Grants ARE NOT a quick fix
- Necessity of revisions
- Possibility of extensions
- Applying and receiving an award is the easy part
- Your grant efforts can be more successful than you think (especially if you're good at paperwork).
