Rep. Sewell Praises Unanimous Passage of Cyber Security Bill out of Committee

The Congresswoman emphasizes the need for information sharing to prevent continued cyber threats

Washington, D.C. – Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement after the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence referred H.R. 1560, the Protecting Cyber Networks Act, to the full House of Representatives:

"Today, I am proud to join my colleagues on the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence in unanimously passing the Protecting Cyber Networks Act, a bipartisan bill that encourages federal agencies and private businesses to share critically important information about cyber threats and attacks.

"There has been a rapid increase in the number of cyberattacks, which costs our economy billions of dollars each year, threatens our national security, and jeopardizes every American's sensitive personal and financial information.

"This bill takes a very important step towards addressing this emerging threat without unduly compromising the privacy of American citizens. I encourage my colleagues to support this legislation when it comes to the House floor so that we can better promote our collective national interests."

Rep. Sewell Votes to Reform Flawed Medicare Physician Payment System

The Congresswoman says the bipartisan solution proves both parties can work together

Washington, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri Sewell voted in favor of H.R. 2, the Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act, which reforms the flawed Medicare physician payment system.

"Today, I joined 392 of my colleagues to pass the Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act, a historic victory for our nation's children, seniors, and working class families. This bipartisan agreement is a permanent fix to Medicare's Sustainable Growth Rate (SGR), which determines physician reimbursement rates, and ensures that our nation's most vulnerable populations continue to have access to quality, essential healthcare and medical services.

"There are many reasons to celebrate passage of this bill, particularly its inclusion of critical funding for community health centers and initiatives that help low-income seniors pay their Medicare Part-B premiums. While I had hoped for a longer extension, the bill does include a two-year extension of the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), providing continued affordable coverage for the families who depend on this vital program.

"I hope today's victory is an indicator that House Democrats and Republicans can work together to tackle other issues of critical importance for all Americans."

EMERGING LEADERS: US-CHINA STUDY DELEGATION 2015 PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Congressional Black Caucus Foundation, Incorporated (CBCF) is partnering with organizations in the U.S. and China to offer an exciting new China study abroad program. The U.S.-China Study Delegation, as the program is called, provides African-American students with the opportunity to experience Chinese culture and learn Mandarin during a two-week visit to China.

Through this program, the CBCF is working to increase career and study options involving US-China relations, expanding opportunities for African Americans in an era of increasing globalization.

This study-abroad experience offers diverse educational activities and excursions taking place over two weeks in Beijing, Hangzhou and Shanghai. Students attend lectures on Chinese history and culture, US-China relations, and Chinese economic development.

Students also participate in cultural activities such as a tour of the Summer Palace and the Great Wall, a visit to the Xixi Wetland Museum, workshops on Chinese paintings and Chinese culinary art.

Interested students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale with declared majors and relevant coursework in Natural sciences, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, Energy development, Trade and Business.



National Park Service Awards Historic Preservation Grants

WASHINGTON – National Park Service Director Jonathan B. Jarvis announced today the distribution of \$46,925,000 for historic preservation grants to the 50 States, the District of Columbia, the U.S. Territories, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau. These funds were appropriated under the Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act, 2015, enacted as Public Law 113-235.

"In partnership with the States and Territories, the National Park Service is committed to preserving our nation's important historic and cultural places, using important tools like these historic preservation grants," said Jarvis. "Looking ahead to the National Park Service's Centennial in 2016, we are committed to telling a more complete and diverse story of America's history in our second century, and this grant program helps us accomplish that goal."

Grants may be used for a broad range of activities such as historic property inventories, resource protection planning, nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, monitoring compliance with Federal historic preservation requirements, technical assistance to private interests that seek to preserve and protect historic resources, assisting local government preservation programs, and acquisition or development of historic properties

The National Park Service will administer these funds as part of the Historic Preservation Fund. Amounts made available to each jurisdiction are listed on the next page.



The online Veterans Employment Center is the single federal source for Veterans looking for new career opportunities in the private and public sectors, as well as Service Members transitioning to the civilian workforce, military and Veteran spouses and dependents looking for employment opportunities, GI Bill beneficiaries transitioning from training to the job market and employers looking to connect with high quality applicants. It is the first interagency tool that brings together public and private job opportunities with resume building and other career tools currently offered on a variety of websites together in one place.

Through the online Veterans Employment Center, Veterans, transitioning Service Members and spouses are connected to high quality career choices by matching their identified skills with available public and

private job opportunities. The site is built using an open application programming interface (API) to attract private sector innovation.

- Quick public resume posting with an instant connection to thousands of public and private employers
- Target job search based on specific, high-demand career paths
- Single search for both public and private sector positions
- Military skills translator and resume generator
- Social media integration with popular bookmarking sites for saving job postings

In connection with the First Lady and Dr. Biden's Joining Forces initiative, the Department of Veterans Affairs worked with the Departments of Defense, Labor, and Education, and the Office of Personnel Management to design and develop the site and incorporate features of existing online employment tools at each agency. The result is an upgrade to the existing Veterans Job Bank and an integrated solution connecting Veterans, transitioning Service Members and employers.
