Rep. Sewell Calls H.R. 5 a "Reverse-Robin Hood Approach to Educational Funding"

Washington, D.C. -- Congresswoman Terri Sewell voted against H.R. 5, the so called Student Success Act, saying the bill diverts much needed resources from poorer school districts to wealthier schools.

"I cannot support the reverse-Robin Hood approach to educational funding contained in H.R. 5, the so-called Student Success Act. This bill would divert Title 1 funds away from poor school districts to wealthier schools, further tilting the playing field against underprivileged children.

"More than 70 percent of students in my district live in poverty. And of the 26 school districts that serve my constituents, only 2 of them have a poverty rate of less than 56 percent. H.R. 5 would take more than \$7 million from the highest need schools in my district and across Alabama, and redistribute that money better off communities.

"H.R. 5 neglects our sacred responsibility to ensure all children -- regardless of race, socioeconomic class, or disability -- are given the same opportunity to obtain a high-quality, public education. This methodology contained in this bill is backwards, and our children deserve so much better."

Congresswoman Terri Sewell Announces \$3.7 Million in Funding to Revitalize the Powell School Building

Birmingham, AL – Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) announced that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has awarded a \$3.7 Million loan to the City of Birmingham to revitalize the Powell School Building.

Integral Group, a local developer, will use the funds to acquire the building which is a vacant former schoolhouse. The building will be converted into 24 units of studio, one-bedroom, and two-bedroom apartments. The property is located in a state-designated redevelopment area in northeast of downtown Birmingham.

"I am thrilled that this award will play a vital role in redeveloping downtown Birmingham. This project will create opportunities for economic development and bring much needed attention to the area. I applaud the efforts of local leaders who have joined together in ensuring that we address deteriorating and blighting structures in the Magic City." Rep. Sewell said.

Rep. Terri Sewell's Statement on Supreme Court's ruling on Marriage Equality

Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement after the Supreme Court ruled in favor of marriage equality:

"There are moments in American history when the trajectory of our nation shifts. Today, the Supreme Court's ruling affirmed the basic principle that our Constitution affords all Americans the same equal protections under the law, while also acknowledging our First Amendment right to maintain our own religious beliefs. Marriage licenses are an instrument of the state, and every person should have the rights afforded to all unions sanctioned by the state. This decision positively upholds the equal dignity of all Americans to enter and have the same rights afforded to every union of marriage."

Rep. Sewell Praises Supreme Court Decision in King v. Burwell

Congresswoman Terri Sewell released the following statement after the Supreme Court announced its decision in King v. Burwell:

"The Supreme Court has once again affirmed that the Affordable Care Act is the law of the land. Today's ruling by the Supreme Court is a victory for the 132,000 Alabamians who will be able to keep their health insurance, including 17,000 of my constituents in the 7th Congressional District.

"The costs of providing care for those without insurance would have been shifted to taxpayers and hospitals had the Supreme Court ruled in favor of the plaintiffs. Our nation would have returned to the days when insurance companies were in charge of our health care system. The Affordable Care Act prevented insurers from discriminating against people with pre-existing conditions and from charging women more than men for the same coverage.

"This lawsuit was another costly attempt to unravel the ACA, and to deny health coverage to the people who most need it. The law works, and the tax credits have helped millions of Americans in every state sign up for health insurance. It's time to put an end to these pointless lawsuits that undermine this monumental law."

FY 2015 Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) Grant Program

Overview

As appropriated by the Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, PDM 2015 (Public Law 114-4); the Fiscal Year (FY) 2015 Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) Grant Program provides resources to assist states, tribal governments, territories and local communities in their efforts to implement a sustained pre-disaster natural hazard mitigation program, as authorized by the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, Public Law 93-288, as amended (42 U.S.C. 5133).

In Fiscal Year 2015, \$30,000,000 is available to assist State, Tribal Territorial and local governments reduce overall risk to the population and structures from future hazard events, while also reducing reliance on federal funding from future disasters.

The Hazard Mitigation Assistance (HMA) Unified Guidance applies to the FY 2015 PDM Grant Program application cycle. Applicants are encouraged to review the Notice of Funding Opportunity announcement and the HMA Guidance for detailed information regarding eligibility and to contact their FEMA Regional Office for additional information.

Funding

In FY 2015, the total amount of funds distributed under the FY 2015 PDM Grant Program will be \$30,000,000.

- All 50 States, the District of Columbia, American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands are eligible to receive a set aside of 1 percent of the total appropriated PDM funding, or \$250,000.
- \$5 million will be set aside for Federally-recognized Tribal governments to receive a set aside of up to 1 percent of the total appropriated PDM funding, or \$250,000 per tribe.
- The balance of PDM Grant Program funds will be distributed on a competitive basis to all eligible applicants.

Eligibility

All 50 States, the District of Columbia, Federally-recognized Tribal governments, American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands are eligible to apply for the FY 2015 PDM Grant Program. Local governments are considered sub-applicants and must apply to their applicant state/territory. Either the state Emergency Management Agency (EMA) or the office that has primary emergency management responsibility is eligible to apply directly to FEMA for PDM Grant Program funds as an applicant; however, only one application will be accepted from each state, tribe or territory.

Federal Emergency Management Agency

Funding Guidelines

The maximum federal share for sub-applications per HMA Guidance is as follows:

- \$3 Million for mitigation projects
- \$400,000 for new mitigation plans
- \$150,000 for mitigation plan updates

A maximum of 10% of the total of mitigation planning and project grants can be used for dissemination of information about the activity. Additionally, a maximum 10 percent of grant funds awarded can be used for applicant management costs, and a maximum of 5 percent of grant funds awarded can be used for subapplicant management costs.

Federal funding is available for up to 75 percent of the eligible activity costs. Small impoverished communities may be eligible for up to a 90 percent Federal cost share in accordance with the Stafford Act. The remaining eligible activity costs are derived from non-Federal sources.

The period of performance for the PDM Grant Program begins with the opening of the application period and ends no later than 36 months from the selection date.

Key FY 2015 PDM Grant Program Changes

- FEMA revised the application limits from FY 2014 to allow a maximum of 3 project sub-applications out of 11 sub-applications per applicant: 10 for mitigation planning and projects, plus 1 management cost sub-application for applicant management costs up to 10% of the total of the planning and project sub-applications.
- FEMA will prioritize mitigation planning and project sub-applications from applicants without Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) funds available before applications from applicants with HMGP funds available.
- FEMA will prioritize activities in communities with the highest assessed Building Code Effectiveness Grading Schedule rating from a grade of 1 to 10.

Application Submission and Review Process

Applications and sub-applications for the PDM Grant Program must be submitted via the Mitigation eGrants system on the FEMA Grants Portal: https://portal.fema.gov. If a subapplicant does not use the eGrants system, then the applicant must enter the paper sub-application(s) into the eGrants system on the sub-applicant's behalf.

Applicants may submit a maximum of 11 sub-applications, including 1 management cost sub-application for Applicant management costs. Of the 10 sub-applications for mitigation activities, a maximum of 3 projects may be included.

Applicants must rank their sub-applications in priority order. To be considered for the State and Tribal set asides, each applicant's number one ranked sub-application must not exceed \$250,000 federal share.

Federal Emergency Management Agency

If any applicant submits more than 10 sub-applications for mitigation activities, FEMA will only consider the 10 highest ranked sub-applications. If any Applicant submits more than 3 project sub-applications, FEMA will only consider the 3 highest ranked projects.

PDM Grant Program applications will undergo a complete eligibility review within their respective FEMA Region. FEMA will review planning and project sub-applications plus one management sub-application submitted by each applicant through the Mitigation eGrants system to ensure compliance with the HMA Guidance, including eligibility of the applicant and sub-applicant; eligibility of proposed activities and costs; completeness of the sub-application; cost effectiveness and engineering feasibility of projects; and eligibility and availability of non-federal cost share.

Evaluation Criteria

FEMA will select eligible planning and project sub-applications in order of the agency's priorities for the FY 2015 PDM Grant Program:

- 1st priority: Mitigation planning and project sub-applications up to \$250,000 Federal share per states/territories/District of Columbia consistent with Section 203 (f) of the Stafford Act
- 2nd priority: Up to \$5 million for mitigation planning and project sub-applications up to \$250,000
 Federal share per tribal applicant
- 3rd priority: Mitigation planning sub-applications from applicants that do not have Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) available
- 4th priority: Non-flood hazard mitigation projects from applicants that do not have HMGP funds available
- 5th priority: Flood mitigation projects from applicants that do not have HMGP funds available
- 6th priority: Planning activities from applicants that have HMGP funds available
- . 7th priority: Non-flood hazard mitigation projects from applicants that have HMGP funds available
- 8th priority: Flood mitigation projects from applicants that have HMGP funds available

FEMA will prioritize planning and project activities within the 3rd through 8th categories above in order by communities with the highest assessed Building Code Effectiveness Grading Schedule (BCEGS) rating from a grade of 1 (exemplary commitment to building code enforcement) to 10. If necessary, FEMA will further prioritize projects by the highest FEMA-validated Benefit Cost Ratio.

USDA Seeks Applications for Grants to Help Socially-Disadvantaged Producers

WASHINGTON, May 26, 2015 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is now accepting applications to provide technical assistance to socially-disadvantaged groups in rural areas.

"These grants will help socially-disadvantaged business owners develop the tools and skills they need to grow their enterprises and succeed at creating jobs and expanding economic opportunities in rural areas," Vilsack said. "American agriculture is becoming increasingly diverse in many ways, with more minorities and women seeking to enter the field, as well as greater diversity in the age of farmers, the size of operations, in production methods, and in the types of crops being grown. All of these forms of diversity help strengthen U.S. agriculture for the future."

Funding will be made available through USDA's <u>Socially-Disadvantaged Groups Grant Program</u> (formerly the Small, Socially-Disadvantaged Producer Grant Program), which assists organizations that provide technical assistance to socially-disadvantaged groups in rural areas. Examples of technical assistance are conducting feasibility studies, developing business and strategic plans, and providing leadership training.

USDA plans to make up to \$3 million in grants available. The maximum award under this notice is \$175,000. More information on how to apply can be found on page 28937 of the May 20 <u>Federal Register</u>. Applications submitted by mail must be postmarked by July 20, 2015. **Electronic applications must be submitted at www.grants.gov** no later than midnight Eastern Time July 14, 2015.

Eligible applicants include groups of cooperatives, cooperative development centers and individual cooperatives that serve socially-disadvantaged groups. The cooperatives or centers can be located in any area, but the groups assisted must be located in an <u>eligible rural area</u>. Also, the majority of the governing body of the organization must be compromised of individuals who are members of socially-disadvantaged groups.

USDA Rural Development is encouraging applications for projects in census tracts with poverty rates of 20 percent or higher. All grants are awarded through a national competition.

The program is making a difference in many rural areas. For example, in 2013, the Southern California Focus on Cooperation (SCFC) received a \$200,000 Small, Socially-Disadvantaged Producer Grant to provide technical assistance to help 95 refugee immigrant and minority farmers improve their productive capacity, increase revenue, and strengthen their ability to govern and manage their cooperative businesses.

Many of the farmers benefiting from the project had little or no access to formal schooling and had been persecuted and oppressed for years in their native land. The International Rescue Committee (IRC), in concert with SCFC, developed marketing channels including various farmers markets and restaurants where the refugee farmers could sell their produce. Farmers have learned how to manage these marketing channels themselves, without assistance from IRC, and have gained new clients. They have also increased the level of cooperation among Hispanic, Korean and African farmer groups. These groups are working toward merging their efforts to form a single cooperative. The technical assistance provided by SCFC has enabled these farmers to build skills that have truly been life changing.

USDA Seeks Applications to Expand Economic Development in Rural Communities

Agriculture Under Secretary Lisa Mensah today announced that USDA is seeking applications for grants to support rural community economic development.

"This funding from USDA will ensure that technical and financial assistance is available for those who wish to improve the quality of life in rural communities," Mensah said. "Very often, great visions for better rural communities exist, but the next steps toward positive change are unclear. These grants will help rural communities build a path to community economic development so rural America can share in the nation's economic recovery."

Approximately \$10.4 million is being made available under the <u>Rural Community Development Initiative (RCDI) program</u>. Eligible applicants include public, private, and non-profit intermediaries, and federally recognized tribes.

RCDI grants can be used to provide training or technical assistance. Training may be focus on homeownership education, minority business entrepreneurship, strategic community planning or accessing alternative funding sources. Intermediary organizations must provide matching funds at least equal to the RCDI grant. Grants range from \$50,000 to \$250,000.

USDA has invested more than \$33 million through the RCDI program since 2009. In 2013, the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma received a \$150,000 grant to provide home buying and home maintenance education to 50 Native American women in the community of Broken Bow.





FACT SHEET: Veterans Employment Center

The online Veterans Employment Center is the single federal source for Veterans looking for new career opportunities in the private and public sectors, as well as Service Members transitioning to the civilian workforce, military and Veteran spouses and dependents looking for employment opportunities, GI Bill beneficiaries transitioning from training to the job market and employers looking to connect with high quality applicants. It is the first interagency tool that brings together public and private job opportunities with resume building and other career tools currently offered on a variety of websites together in one place. Through the online Veterans Employment Center, Veterans, transitioning Service Members and spouses are connected to high quality career choices by matching their identified skills with available public and private

job opportunities. The site is built using an open application programming interface (API) to attract private sector innovation.

Veteran Applicant Resources:

- Quick public resume posting with an instant connection to thousands of public and private employers
- Target job search based on specific, high-demand career paths
- Single search for both public and private sector positions
- Military skills translator and resume generator
- Social media integration with popular bookmarking sites for saving job postings

Employer Resources:

- Access targeted feed of qualified resumes from Veteran applicants
- View reverse skills translation (military to civilian skills) for applicants
- Set Veterans hiring goals and track progress
- Connect to resources designed to help recruit and retain talented, Veteran employees

In connection with the First Lady and Dr. Biden's Joining Forces initiative, the Department of Veterans Affairs worked with the Departments of Defense, Labor, and Education, and the Office of Personnel Management to design and develop the site and incorporate features of existing online employment tools at each agency. The result is an upgrade to the existing Veterans Job Bank and an integrated solution connecting Veterans, transitioning Service Members and employers.

Employers, Veterans and transitioning Service Members deserve a single, authoritative source for connecting to each other. Now that the core tools and an integrated search function exist in one single location, each agency is engaged in minimizing duplication and redundancy of current sites and services.
