USDA Announces \$1.6 Million in Investments for the 7th Congressional District

Today Congresswoman Terri Sewell welcomed U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack to Alabama's 7th Congressional District where he announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing \$1.6 million in various projects within Alabama's 7th Congressional District.

Secretary Vilsack made the announcement during his tour through the 7th Congressional District with Congresswoman Sewell. They began their district tour with a groundbreaking ceremony in Whitehall to launch a waste water treatment plant that received a \$1.02 million grant and a \$112,000 USDA loan. Secretary Vilsack also joined Congresswoman Sewell for a tour of Kyser Catfish Farm in Greensboro and a roundtable discussion with local catfish farmers in Marengo County.

"I am so thrilled that USDA has made these significant investments in my district. Sustaining and supporting rural communities is critically important to the well-being of the constituents who will benefit from these projects," said Congresswoman Sewell.

Rep. Sewell Expresses Disappointment with Alabama House's Vote to Cut Medicaid Funding

Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-7) released the following statement after the Alabama State House passed a General Fund Budget that includes a \$156 million cut to the state Medicaid Agency:

"I am outraged that the Alabama State House of Representatives cut \$156 million from the Alabama Medicaid Agency. This is a fiscally and morally deplorable way to cover the state's budget shortfall. The impact on Children's Hospital, rural hospitals and nursing homes would be devastating, if not fatal.

If the state legislature wants to get serious about fixing Alabama's economic woes, lawmakers should urge the governor to expand Medicaid. The decision to not expand Medicaid will cost the state \$3.63 billion in federal funding, 15,100 jobs, and \$2.6 billion in increased economic activity through 2017.

I am hopeful that this budget proposal will not pass in the Senate and that both chambers will come to an agreement on a budget that isn't balanced on the backs of our most vulnerable citizens."

Rep. Sewell Pledges to Fight for Stronger Voter Protections

Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965:

"Our constitutionally guaranteed right to vote was paid for by the life of Jimmie Lee Jackson, and the untold sacrifices of the brave Foot Soldiers of the Voting Rights Movement. Their courage led to the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 – a landmark law that fulfilled promises made by the Constitution.

"We need not count marbles in a jar or memorize the name of every county judge, but new barriers have replaced overt efforts to suppress voter turnout. These new barriers – such as voter ID laws or changing polling locations without public notice – have been passed off as measures needed to protect the vote, but in reality they have only made it harder to vote.

"The Voting Rights Act abolished many barriers to the ballot box, and ensured that every vote would count. I stood beside my Democratic colleagues in the House and Senate last week to call for full restoration of the federal protections afforded by the Voting Rights Act.

"As a daughter of Selma and a beneficiary of the Voting Rights Movement, I pledge to be on the frontlines of the legislative fight for federal voter protections. Congress must begin by restoring the Voting Rights Act of 1965. I have introduced the Voting Rights Advancement Act with a modern day formula to determine voter suppression. We cannot return to the days when only some votes mattered. All votes matter. Our nation will cease to be a democracy if we impose arbitrary and unnecessary barriers that silence any voices within our electorate."

Rep. Sewell Reiterates Call for Congress to Restore the Voting Rights Act

Today, Congresswoman Terri Sewell again called on Congress to restore critical federal protections to protect the sacred right to vote for vulnerable communities.

"The courageous Foot Soldiers of the Voting Rights Movement prayed for, marched for, and were willing to die for the right to vote. Our vote has been consecrated by their sacrifice, and the unwavering heroism they demonstrated by walking across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. The landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965 was born out of the struggle for voting equality, and addressed the need to expand federal voting protections so that no citizen is denied his or her constitutionally-guaranteed right to vote.

"In 2013, the Supreme Court gutted a key provision of the Voting Rights Act that determined which jurisdictions need to seek permission from the U.S. Department of Justice before changing their electoral laws. Since then, we have witnessed a steady erosion of federal voter protections and a renewed assault on our sacred right to vote in the form of photo IDs and other tactics designed to suppress voter turnout.

"Congress cannot stand idly by as localities erect unnecessary barriers to the ballot box. The Supreme Court has issued us a challenge, and that challenge is to find a modern-day formula that applies to jurisdictions with a recent history of racial discrimination in voting.

"The Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2015 meets that challenge. I worked alongside Reps. Linda Sanchez and Judy Chu and Senators Leahy, Durbin and Coons to create a new legal framework that addresses the continued need for federal voting protections.

"The fate of our democracy rests in our hands. When we restrict the right to vote, we are silencing voices within our electorate. Our democracy works best whenever all eligible voters have unfettered, and unrestricted access to the ballot box."

USDA Announces \$349 Million in Funding for Rural Electric Infrastructure Projects including \$17 Million in Smart Grid Technology

WASHINGTON, July 21, 2015 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today <u>announced \$349 million in funding</u> for 15 rural electric infrastructure projects to build or improve more than 1,844 miles of transmission and distribution lines for rural electric cooperatives and utilities in 13 states.

"Eighty years ago, USDA took on the challenge of bringing power to rural America and it helped make this the greatest, most productive country on Earth," said Vilsack. "Today we are continuing that commitment by investing in the next generation of power transmission – smart grid technology – to make our electric system more reliable, efficient and effective. Upgrading the electric grid will not only improve reliability and better manage costs, but it will also bring jobs and increased economic opportunities, helping to build a sustainable and dynamic future for rural residents and businesses."

The funding is being provided through USDA Rural Development's <u>Electric Program</u>, which makes insured loans and loan guarantees to non-profit and cooperative associations, public bodies and other utilities. The loans primarily finance the construction of electric distribution facilities in rural areas.

For example, the Macon Electric Cooperative in Missouri has been selected to receive a \$15.2 million loan to build or improve 51 miles of line and make other system improvements. The loan includes \$2 million for smart grid projects.

The Douglas Electric Cooperative, Inc. in South Dakota is receiving \$1.3 million to build and improve 15 miles of line and make other system improvements. The loan amount includes \$270,000 for smart grid projects.

The Minnesota Valley Electric Cooperative will receive a \$25.5 million loan to build or improve 171 miles of line and make other system improvements. The loan includes \$2 million for smart grid projects and \$222,000 for service to Native Americans.

The total of \$349 million in electric loans includes a \$44 million loan to Eastern Iowa Light & Power Cooperative announced by Vilsack on July 17.

Smart grid increases the reliability of electric power by helping utilities better manage the electric grid to improve operational efficiencies. It includes metering, substation automation, computer applications, two-way communications, geospatial information systems, and other system improvements.

USDA has been committed to improving production and transmission of electricity for rural America since the creation of the Rural Electrification Administration in 1935. In 2014 alone, USDA's Rural Utilities Service awarded \$2.7 billion in electric loans. These loans helped 4.6 million rural residents receive improved electric service.

President Obama's plan for rural America has brought about historic investment and resulted in stronger rural communities. Under the President's leadership, these investments in housing, community facilities, businesses and infrastructure have empowered rural America to continue leading the way - strengthening America's economy, small towns and rural communities.

Agriculture Secretary Vilsack Announces Available Funding and Changes to USDA's Biorefinery and Biobased Product Program

WASHINGTON, July 16, 2015 – Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that USDA is accepting applications for funding under a program that supports the production of advanced biofuels, renewable chemicals, and biobased product manufacturing.

"This critical financing will enhance our efforts to build a robust, rural bioeconomy by helping to expand the availability of biobased products and to increase the number of commercial-scale biorefineries in the country," Vilsack said. "In addition to the available funding, I am proud to announce that USDA has significantly improved the biorefinery program to help create lasting job opportunities in rural America."

USDA is making the funding available through the <u>Biorefinery, Renewable Chemical, and Biobased Product Manufacturing Assistance Program</u>. It was formerly known as the Biorefinery Assistance Program.

The new program provides loan guarantees of up to \$250 million to construct and retrofit commercial-scale biorefineries and to develop renewable chemicals and biobased product manufacturing facilities. Vilsack and USDA Rural Business-Cooperative Service Administrator Lillian Salerno today hosted a seminar at USDA headquarters to discuss changes to the program and the opportunities available to produce more biobased products.

Two funding cycles are being held. Applications for round one are due October 1. Applications for the second round are due April 1, 2016. For information on how to apply, see page 38432 of the July 6, 2015 Federal Register.

USDA has made significant improvements to the program. Biorefineries are now able to receive funding to produce more renewable chemicals and other biobased products in addition to advanced biofuels.

Also, biobased product manufacturing facilities are eligible to convert renewable chemicals and other biobased outputs into "end-user" products. Further, USDA has streamlined the application process.

Sapphire Energy's "Green Crude Farm" in Columbus, N.M., is an example of how USDA funding and partnerships with the private sector are helping to support the development of biorefineries. In 2011, USDA provided Sapphire Energy a \$54.5 million loan guarantee to build a refined algal oil commercial facility.

The plant opened in May 2012 and is producing renewable algal oil that can be further refined to replace petroleum-derived diesel and jet fuel. According to the company, more than 600 jobs were created throughout the first phase of construction at the facility, and 30 full-time employees currently operate the plant. After Sapphire received additional equity from private investors, it repaid the remaining balance on its USDA-backed loan in 2013.

USDA released a <u>new report</u> on June 17 that shows America's biobased industry is generating substantial economic activity and creating American jobs. According to the report, the U.S. biobased industry contributed four million jobs and nearly \$370 billion to the American economy in 2013 alone.

Today's funding announcement was made possible by the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past five years while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for taxpayers. USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life.




