Rep. Sewell Encourages High School Seniors to Register to Vote

Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement in recognition of National Voter Registration Day:

"Our votes are our voice, and every eligible voter should make his or her voice heard. It's important that we encourage and engage younger voters. Historically, young adults ages 18-24 are less likely to vote as compared to older adults. Voting is one of our most fundamental rights. We cannot take it for granted.

"National Voter Registration Day encourages high school seniors to register to vote, and to become active and engaged citizens within their communities. As a daughter of Selma, I cannot forget the sacrifices that were made by the brave men and women who laid their lives on the line so that all Americans can enjoy their Constitutionally-guaranteed right to vote.

"We must honor that legacy by voting in each and every election – local, state, and federal. I am calling on our young people to register to vote. You are the future, and we need to hear your voices."

Rep. Sewell Issues Statement in Observance of the Anniversary of 9/11

Today, Congresswoman Terri Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement in observance of the 14th anniversary of September 11, 2001:

"On this day 14 years ago, our nation was forever changed by the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11. Today, we honor those who lost their lives and pay homage to the courageous first responders whose bravery helped to save the lives of so many affected by this tragedy. I hope we will remember these American heroes as the James Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act is set to expire. If Congress does not act this could jeopardize the medical monitoring, care, and compensation program responders and survivors across the country. We must work to preserve this legislation and give them the resources they need to continue to heal. They deserve nothing less.

"As a member of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, I understand the fight against terrorism is one that we must always take seriously as a country. However, this tragedy also taught us the importance of working together. We share a common humanity, and must be vigilant in our collective efforts to protect it. This is critical to protecting our beloved country and ensuring that these ideals are passed on to future generations."

Rep. Sewell Applauds Senator Murkowski for Supporting the Voting Rights Advancement Act

Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement after Republican Senator Lisa Murkowski of Alaska signed on to the Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2015 as a co-sponsor.

"I am excited that the Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2015 has bipartisan support in the Senate. Senator Lisa Murkowski of Alaska became the first Republican to support the bill, and I am hopeful that other Republicans – in both the House and Senate – will join our efforts to restore federal voting protections.

"The Voting Rights Advancement Act reaffirms our commitment to voter equality and creating more pathways to voter access. The updated coverage ensures that states, like Alabama, are required to obtain preclearance for changes to voting practices and procedures and includes critical protections for Native Americans, naturalized citizens, and disabled voters.

"It is my hope that Congress rises to the challenge issued that the Supreme Court issued us. The Voting Rights Advancement Act contains a modern-day formula that requires states and localities with a recent history of racial discrimination in voting to seek approval from the U.S. Department of Justice before making any changes to their electoral laws.

"The landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965 was born out of the struggle for voting equality, and addressed the need to expand federal voting protections so that no citizen is denied his or her constitutionally-guaranteed right to vote. The fate of our democracy rests with each and every citizen's right to vote."

MUSEUM GRANTS FOR AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE

Deadline: December 01, 2015

Application: The <u>Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for FY 2016</u> is now available.

Grant Amount: \$5,000-\$150,000 **Grant Period:** Up to three years

Cost Share Requirement:

For applications requesting Museum Grants for African American History and Culture of more than \$25,000, you must provide funds from non-federal sources in an amount that is equal to or greater than the amount of the request. No cost sharing is permitted for applications requesting amounts from \$5,000-\$25,000.

Program Overview:

Museum Grants for African American History and Culture (AAHC) support projects that improve the operations, care of collections, and development of professional management at African American museums.

AAHC grants can fund both new and ongoing museum activities and programs.

Eligibility:

Museums that fulfill the <u>eligibility criteria for museums may apply</u>. Eligible applicants include museums whose primary purpose is African American life, art, history, and/or culture, encompassing: the period of slavery; the era of Reconstruction; the Harlem renaissance; the civil rights movement; and other periods of the African American diaspora. Nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to support museums identified above may also apply. Historically Black Colleges or Universities (HBCUs) are also eligible. Please see program guidelines for specific eligibility criteria.

Taking Broadband to the Next Level Posted

Getting broadband to unserved rural areas is one of the toughest challenges we face. It's far easier to make a business case to serve 500 people per square mile than it is where there are only five people per square mile. Broadband is expensive to deploy through hundreds of miles of countryside, including mountains, canyons, forests and deserts. But that's our challenge.

The Broadband Opportunity Council report the White House released today lays the groundwork to build on the tremendous success of deploying broadband under the Recovery Act, which helped USDA and the Commerce Department expand essential broadband service nationwide. Yet even with this historical investment, we have much more to do.

Our work with the Commerce Department's National Telecommunications Information Administration and about 25 federal agency representatives identified federal regulatory and funding barriers to broadband expansion. If we are to deploy broadband to the 50 percent of rural areas without access to high-speed service, we will need to work hard and work closely with our federal partners and private stakeholders to encourage buildout and adoption.

The rewards are great. For example, one of our Recovery Act broadband projects in Western North Carolina brings people off the mountain so they can use newly connected facilities in an old library, helps troops overseas watch their kids play baseball via a ballfield with internet access, and makes it easier for families to virtually visit Granny while she enjoys her chicken dinner at the local nursing home.

USDA's Rural Utilities Service funds rural utilities across the country. Rural electric cooperatives, telecommunications systems and water and waste facilities have the connections and expertise in their communities to deliver services that increase the quality of life for rural residents. RUS borrowers have been and will continue to be the heroes that get the job done. So in the days ahead as we work toward implementing the goals spelled out in this report, I am looking for our rural stakeholders to offer guidance, expertise and partnership in delivering broadband in areas lacking high speed internet service. —

National Preparedness Month Kicks Off on September 1

Washington – Disasters like floods, hurricanes, wildfires, tornadoes, and earthquakes are a harsh and frequent reality for much of the country. According to a recent survey conducted by FEMA, progress has been made; however, fewer than half of Americans have discussed and developed an emergency plan with their household.

Today, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Ad Council launched a new series of public service announcements (PSAs) to encourage families to develop an emergency communication plan before a disaster occurs. An extension of the national *Ready* campaign, the new PSAs launch in conjunction with the 12th annual National Preparedness Month, serving as a reminder to take action to prepare for the types of hazards that could impact where you live, work, and vacation.

"The last thing you want to be worried about during a disaster is how to communicate with your family members," said Administrator Craig Fugate. "Have that conversation today. It doesn't cost a thing."

The new campaign includes English and Spanish-language TV, radio, outdoor, print and digital PSAs. Created *pro bono* by Chicago-based advertising agency Schafer Condon Carter, the PSAs illustrate the importance of having a family plan in the event of an emergency by showing real emergency moments and asking the question, "when is the right time to prepare?" The viewer is encouraged to develop a family emergency communication plan through the clear message, "Don't wait. Communicate." The PSAs direct audiences to Ready.gov/communicate for tools and resources to help develop and practice a family emergency communication plan.

"Through the *Ready* campaign, we've made a lot of progress educating and empowering Americans to prepare for all types of emergencies but there are still so many families that don't have a plan, said Lisa Sherman, President and CEO of the Ad Council. "Having these conversations is really important and can have a big impact on our families' safety in the event of a disaster."

"SCC is honored to work with the Ad Council and FEMA on the *Ready* campaign," said David Selby, President and Managing Partner of SCC. "This new campaign provides powerful imagery and a critically important call-to-action that we hope will cause individuals and families to pay attention, lean in and, ultimately, take action."

Localized television and radio PSAs were created and will be available for 27 states, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Washington D.C., and New York City as part of an ongoing collaboration with state and local emergency management partners. These PSAs drive audiences to their local organization's website for resources and information pertinent to their area.

As an extension of the national *Ready* campaign, versions of the PSAs were created for *Ready New York*, a local initiative that was launched in partnership with the New York City Office of Emergency Management in 2009. Tailoring the message to the unique challenges faced by people living in New

York City, audiences are directed to call 311 or visit NYC.gov/readyny, where they can find preparedness resources, including 11 *Ready New York* guides in 13 languages and audio format.

Managed and sponsored by the *Ready* campaign, National Preparedness Month is designed to raise awareness and encourage Americans to take steps to prepare for emergencies in their homes, schools, organizations, businesses, and places of worship. National Preparedness Month is an opportunity to share emergency preparedness information and host activities across the country to help Americans understand what it truly means to be ready.

National Preparedness Month culminates with National PrepareAthon! Day on September 30 when cities and counties across the country are planning community-wide events bringing together schools, their business community, government, faith leaders, hospitals, individuals and families, and others to participate in community-wide preparedness drills and activities for hazards that are relevant to their area.

Since the launch in 2003, the *Ready* Campaign has received nearly \$1.2 billion in donated media. The Campaign helps to generate more than 92 million unique visitors to Ready.gov. The Ad Council is distributing the new PSAs to media outlets nationwide this week, and the PSAs will run in donated time and space.




