Direct Grants: Requirements

- Non-profit
- 3-year history of programming
- 1-to-1 match for project budget
- Meet reporting requirements on any previous NEA awards
- Complete interim and final reports on time

- Level 3: Chairman of the NEA

Art Works

- Submit to one of twelve artistic disciplines
- All project outcomes are now welcome at all deadlines
- Semi-annual opportunity
 - Matching grants from \$10,000 to \$100,000
 - o <u>Art Works Deadline</u>:
 - Submit SF-424 to Grants.gov July 14, 2016
 - Submit Materials to NEA-GO July 21, 2016 to July 28, 2016
 - Notification: April 2017
 - Earliest Start Date: June 1, 2017

Challenge America

- Must reach an underserved population
- Streamlined application process
- Annual opportunity
 - Matching grants are \$10,000
 - Submit SF-424 to Grants.gov recently passed
 - Submit Materials to NEA-GO recently passed
 - Notification: December 2016
 - Earliest Start Date: January 1, 2017





Our Town

- Creative placemaking projects contribute to the livability of communities and place the arts at their core
- Applicants must be partnerships and must include: a nonprofit design or cultural organization, and a <u>local</u> government entity
 - Emphasis on community-based partnerships
- Annual opportunity
 - Matching grants range from \$25,000 to \$200,000
 - Submit SF-424 to Grants.gov September 12, 2016
 - Submit Materials to NEA-GO September 19, 2016

for the Arts

- Notification: April 2017
- Earliest Start Date: August 1, 2017



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Other Design Initiatives

- Exploring Our Town
 - Project Showcase: explore recent creative placemaking projects
 - Project Insights: explore lessons learned
- Mayors' Institute on City Design
 - Prepares mayors to be the chief urban designers of their cities
- Citizens' Institute on Rural Design
 - Builds communities upon their existing assets to improve the way a community looks, its quality of life, and its economic viability.





Research: Art Works

- Projects explore the arts impact on local and/or national economic development; the health of arts and cultural organizations; and the links between arts engagement and cognitive, social, civic, and behavioral outcomes.
- Primary and/or secondary data analyses, quantitative studies, qualitative studies, mixed-method studies, psychological studies, economic impact studies, meta-analyses, program evaluations, translational research
 - $\,\circ\,$ Matching grants range from \$10,000 to \$30,000
 - Deadline: Usually in the Fall of each year
 - Earliest Start Date: May the following year

Creative Writing Fellowships

Fellowships in fiction, poetry, and creative nonfiction enable recipients to set aside time for writing, research, travel, and general career advancement.

- Non-matching grants are for \$25,000
- Deadline: Recently passed
- Notification: December 2016
- Earliest Start Date: January 1, 2017





State and Regional Partnerships

By supporting the state arts agencies (SAAs) and regional arts organizations (RAOs) through Partnership Agreements, the Arts Endowment makes the arts available in more communities than it could through direct grants.

- Register with SAM (System for Award Management). SAM must be current to apply through the grants.gov system.
- Select a Point of Contact who will be accessible and monitor e-mail. Grants.gov sends e-mail notifications for errors and application validation.
